MR. MEIGHEN OPENS FIRE

The first important speech in the new Parliament at Ottawa was delivered by the Leader of the Opposition, Hon. Arthur Meighen. He unhesitatingly placed his finger on the weak spots of the King policy as already disclosed and indicated whether it tended.

As yet 'nothing' tangible has resulted from these movements, and the latest effort to move the government to action by the influential and representative delegation which waited upon them on Friday last proved to be rather unpromising and disappointing.

Such an answer opens but a slender prospect indeed. It is singularly bald and cold, as well as disappointing. That no money has been voted only shows a neglect in the past which, however, was not a fair remedy in the future.

The Leader of the Opposition dealt succinctly with the Western Reserves problem and the recent proposals showing them exactly in their true light and what they meant to Canada now and in the future.

Were it otherwise, were he really favorable, would he interpose every possible objection, as he has done, to the favorable consideration of the application? Why does he say the Government has no power to act, there is no money voted, the treasury is empty? True he says he will consult his followers in the House, but under what conditions? Before he asks them and even in the face of those making the application, he raises the burthen of additional taxation to frighten them against making a grant? He will consult his supporters, but only after he has shown every evidence of his own personal interest.

The American Society for the Control of Cancer, at its recent annual meeting announced that the sum of \$50,000 had been entrusted to the Society by the family of Mrs. M. Lasker, New York City, for establishing a memorial fund to the memory of Harry M. Lasker, who died of cancer on March 13, 1921.

Dr. Francis Carter Wood, director of the Institute of Cancer Research, Columbia University, believes that this donation will aid very greatly in the fight now begun to check the ravages of cancer.

It is hoped that when scientific research reveals more of the true nature of this disease a medical cure may be obtained. Until that time arrives, however, surgery, radium and X-ray are the only reliable methods of treatment. This is what must be told and the telling must be done over and over this condition of affairs education again.

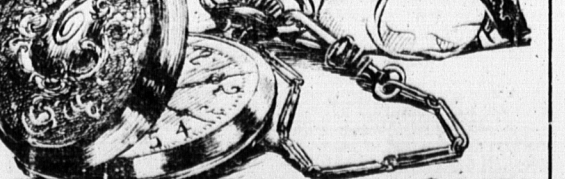

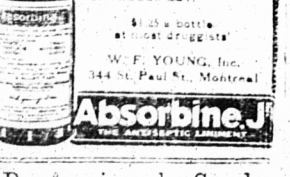
