The Abegweit contingent will join the Montreal club team at Montreal and the two parties will travel together by private cars to St. Louis. The Montreal contingent consists of five athletes and ten or twelve club members. Among the former are Peter Deer, the Indian distance runner, and Percy Milson the McGill College athlete. 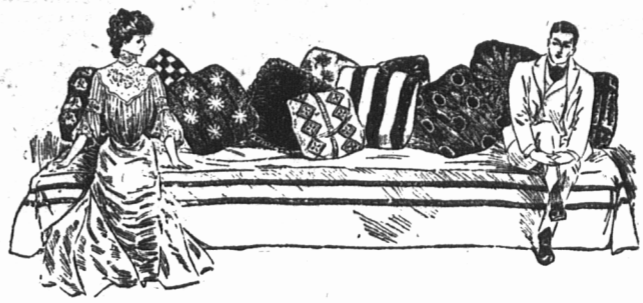

Rev Ewen McDonald, St. Charles Bridge occupied the pulpit of Zion Church yesterday morning and St James last evening. The reverend gentleman preached eloquent and thoughtful sermons on both occasions.

THE death of Mrs. Johnston, wife of John Johnston, etc. occurred on Saturday at the residence of her son, Rev. J. J. Johns on, St. Margarets, whom she had gone to visit. Deceased was taken ill with pneumonia from which she suffered about a week and her death came as a sudden shock to the family. She was 70 years of age and much esteemed by her many friends. Her sons R. E. and Dr. Johnston, Bo ton, arrived home Saturday night. J. J. Johns on, barrister, city, is another son. The Guardian extends its deepest sympathy to the bereaved family. Her remains were brought to the city Saturday evening.

At the morning service yesterday in First Methodist Church Rev. Mr. Dobson took for his text I Kings 8, 27 "But will indeed dwell on the earth." After proving that Christ dwelt on earth he referred to the late Robert and Mrs. Longworth, in whose memory the new memorial windows were donated by their son the late Israel Longworth, Clerk, as persons in whom God dwelt, the windows thus symbolizing redemption. On either side of the choir gallery these windows are placed adding much beauty and light to the interior of the church. They are each 18 ft. by 9 and were manufactured by McAusland, Toronto at a cost of \$2000. On the southern window is a scene representing the Saviour entering a home. Inscribed along the floor streamer border are the words: "My peace I give unto you, no; as the world giveth." On the other window is a characteristic Biblical scene, and the text "Let not your hearts be troubled. If ye believe in God, believe also in me." On each window the name of the deceased whom it memorializes is placed. The late Robert Longworth was one of the first trustees of the church, and held the office for many years. He was one of the most prominent citizens of Charlottetown and was the first President of the Merchants' Bank of P. E. Island. Several years ago he removed to Toronto where he died.

ONE of the last meetings of the South East Prince District Conventions was held in the Hampton Pres. Church on Tuesday Aug 16th. Both sessions were well attended and thirteen schools were represented out of sixteen enrolled. Social services were led by Welling on Callbeck and Major Loather. In the afternoon after minutes were read the matter of finances was taken up and thoroughly discussed concluding that the prospects were not alarming in this respect. Our Field Secretary then gave a black-board lesson on "The Teaching Method". He stated that the teachers should first arouse the activity of the scholars in the way of thinking; second, present the lesson facts; third, transition, fourth, apply the lesson to their lives. Rev. Mr. Stebbings then gave an address on "Interest in S. S. work." He said the school-room should be made attractive. Select suitable hymns, have good music; try and interest the scholars in a practical way; be interested in the work ourselves; use tact; in our teaching add the effect upon their lives will be great. Lastly interest them in the Lord as it is the greatest purpose of all. In the evening Rev. A. D. McDonald read a paper on "How can our converts be made more helpful" which was of a very practical nature. It was followed by much discussion the result being that it was moved by Rabb Lord, seconded by Major Loather and carried unanimously that two institute meetings be held in different parts of the district sometime in November, each to have three sessions. These meetings were well attended and much appreciated. This was followed by a talk by the Field Worker on "child life and child nature," stating that a child's nature should be studied and treated accordingly; to do otherwise would mean disaster. A vote of thanks was moved for the excellent assistance of the choir and also for the hospitality of the people, after which the convention closed with benediction.

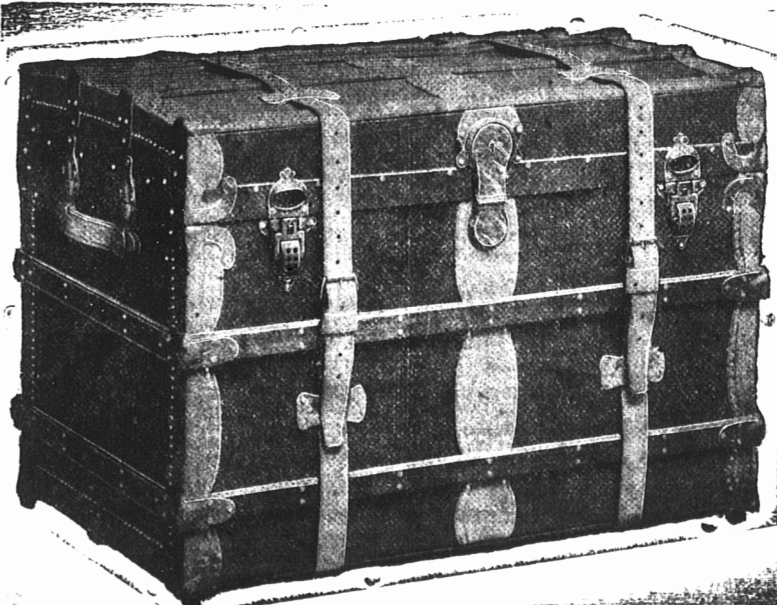

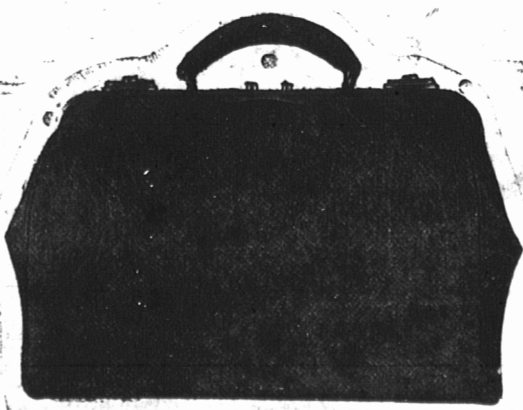
