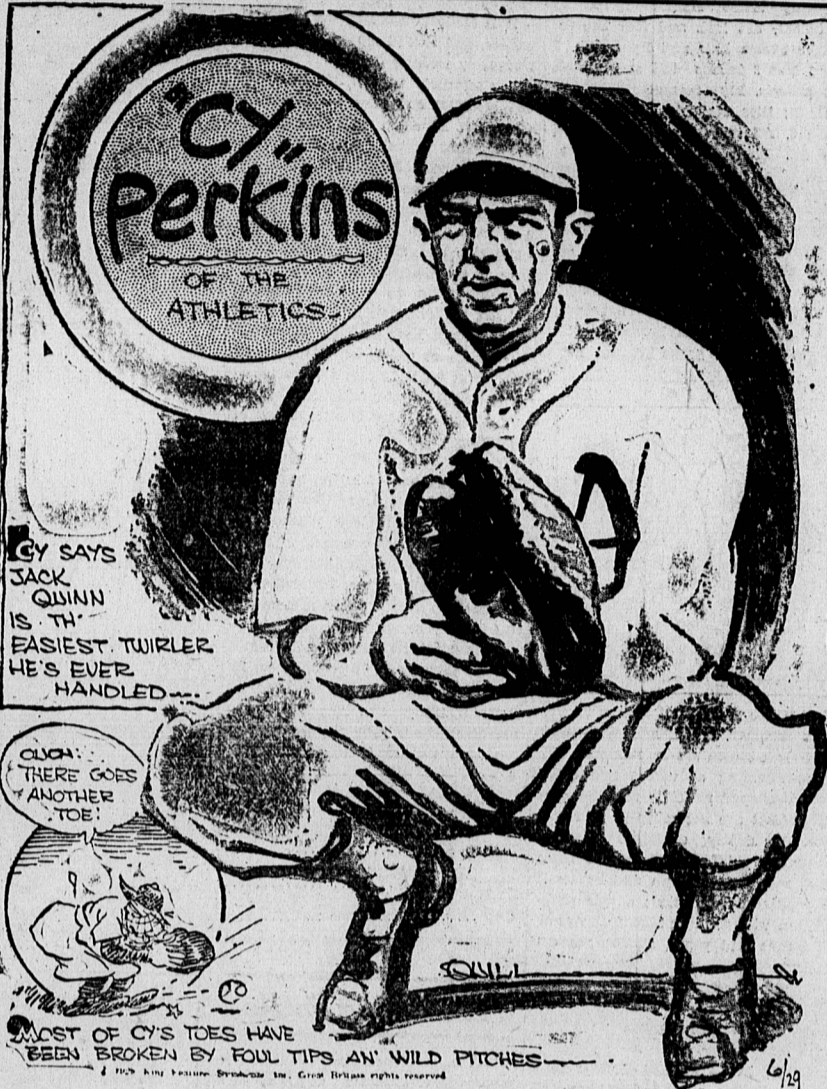

An All-Time Catcher

Look at the hands of the average big league catcher, and you'll find most of his fingers gnarled and disjointed. Examine the mitts of Cy Perkins, veteran backstop of the Philadelphia Athletics, and you will notice that they are still almost perfect in construction. But follow him to the club house after a game. Watch him knock off his shoes and peel off his socks and you will find that each toe on both feet is twisted out of shape!

After twelve years' campaigning, Cy probably has more gnarled toes and less gnarled fingers than any catcher under the big top. Cy had his toes bugged up during the early days of his career through foul tips and wild pitches. During his service in the major leagues Cy has handled some of the best twirlers. Perkins now declares that he never knew what easy catching was until he started in to handle Jack Quinn, aged spitball artist of the A's. According to Perkins, Quinn's control is next to perfect, thus accounting in part for the softness of the catching assignment.

while Quinn is on the mound. Just before the Athletics acquired Cochrane, the veteran Perkins was nursing an ambition to lead all catchers in the number of games played. But Cy gave up that idea two months after Cochrane joined the club. He decided to give up in favor of the youngster who last year was voted the most valuable player in the American League.

Even as it is, Cy is one of the few catchers who can boast of having caught more than 1,200 games. Ray Schalk, formerly of the White Sox, holds the world's record in this respect, with a total of 1,720

PLEASED WITH MARITIMES

MONCTON, N. B., July 4.—"We thought Nova Scotia was a cold barren spot, but I find it a place of beauty and rich fertility," said L. Persson, a Swedish journalist, who is making a tour of the Maritime Provinces under the auspices of the colonization department of the Canadian National Railways. Mr. Persson arrived at Halifax from Sweden on June 28 last, and in company with F. C. Blett, Superintendent of Colonization of the National system for the Maritime Provinces, has visited the south shore of Nova Scotia, including Lunenburg, Yarmouth and the Annapolis Valley, the Malagash and Tatamagouche districts. He then visited Prince Edward Island, and is in Moncton today enroute to the Sussex district and the Saint John Valley, after which he will visit the Canadian west.

Mr. Persson considers the Maritime Provinces are particularly adapted to his countrymen for settling and is very much enthused with what he has seen. He visited the Moncton airport, and leaves here tonight to complete his tour of New Brunswick, before proceeding west.

Mrs. Persson accompanied her husband to Canada and has entered domestic service with the idea of obtaining a better understanding of conditions in Canada and the possibilities for Swedish women emigrating for domestic service.

Rev. G. W. Ford, pastor of the First Church of Christ in Crookston, (and a native of this province, three brothers residing in Charlottetown) late yesterday performed a wedding ceremony over Grand Forks which came the nearest to Heaven of any similar rites in the history of North Dakota says the Crookston Daily Times.

The Crookston pastor climbed into an airplane about 6 p. m. yesterday according to an Associated Press dispatch, together with four others and the pilot, and went aloft to wed two of the passengers Leora Ellen Oliver of Grand Forks and Virgil E. Knight of Plaxton, both students at the University of North Dakota.

The knot was tied hundreds of feet above the noisy turmoil of Grand Forks traffic, with Miss Berchold Olse of Fargo as maid of honor and Carlos W. Nesler of Minneapolis as best man.

Orvil Shupe of Devils Lake piloted the couple to the scene of the wedding, keeping the altar on an even keel while Mr. Ford performed the ceremony and brought the man and wife back to the airport for a shower of rice and old shoes.

N. Cameau who has been detailed by the government to assume charge of the hunting of the porpoises, is leaving shortly for Thunder River and other points of the north shore where the animals are most abundant and will employ both rifles and traps in his effort to stamp out the menace.

**INSTRUCTING THE BLIND**—Miss Marcelina Boudreau, one of the home teachers in the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, who has been in Charlottetown for the past three months, leaves on Monday to take up duties in New Brunswick. Previous to coming to Charlottetown she spent four months in Prince County. In both sections she had quite a number of pupils, whom she instructed in Braille reading by finger touch, basketry and handicraft. It is gratifying to note that the pupils whom she has instructed in various lines of handicraft are finding ready sale for their work and are receiving profitable returns. Miss Boudreau is a graduate of the Halifax School for the Blind and is well educated. With insufficient sight to read ordinary print, she is able to read by finger touch as fluently as if possessed of full eyesight. In this way she is able to keep abreast of the times in literature and current events through the excellent magazines and periodicals supplied to the blind by the Institute library in Toronto.

He also stated that the work done by Mr. Curley was of a very high standard and that it would be hard to equal in the coming year. "Out of the Ruins" is a story of France prior to and after the close of the World War. But first of all it is a love story, a sweet, appealing romance of a boy and a girl and probably in all screenland, no two artists could be found who could portray the young couple in this tender story better than Barthelmess and Miss Nixon.

Always the consummate actor, Barthelmess is appealing and genuine in the character of Lieut. Pierre Dumont of the French Army. He brings to that role all the sincere and boyish enthusiasm that Sir Philip Gibbs, author of the original story, gave to Pierre. Barthelmess has often been known as the typical American boy of the screen. In "Out of the Ruins" he demonstrated that he may be the typical French boy as well — or any other nationality. As known to nationalities, and the gifted actor has demonstrated this on more than one occasion. Miss Nixon is quite the most charming and lovely young woman we have seen in Barthelmess' screen embrace. Their love scenes are skilfully directed and cleverly acted. The cast is not a large one, but it is composed of a number of capable players. Robert Frazer cleverly portrays the girl's brother, who in injuries brings blindness. The French scenes on the set and in the cafes are convincing, the little touch of battle is wonderfully vivid. However, it is primarily as a story that "Out of the Ruins" will be remembered — and such a love story. Don't miss it. The closing chapter of "The Fire Detective" and the first chapter of the new Prince Edward serial run out a fine week end bill.
