—P. E. ISLAND BAG FACTORY BUSY — The Bag Factory at Summerside has been very busy this season, turning out bags at a rapid rate, with an estimated output of 500,000 bags this season. The difficulty in securing jute and the delay in the streets has kept the factory busy, and still unable to supply the demand. The heavy shipments of potatoes has called for increased manufacture of bags.

—RANCHERS COMMENCE PELTING — Island fox ranchers have commenced to pelting foxes and many pelts are being brought into Summerside. There has been some call for pelts and consignments are advertising the dates of fur sales. The Fox Education Week at this season of the year should be of value to the rancher about to pelt as he can be advised whether his foxes are prime or not.

—APPLE DAY AT S'IDE — The By Scout Apple Day at Summerside was an outstanding success and the streets were lined with about 3000. The sales were supervised by the Rangers and Mr. A. B. L. Horne very kindly allowed his building to be used as headquarters. The three Summerside troops took part in the sales and the public responded generously. The rain did not seem to dampen the spirits of the children, they stayed out quite late to dispose of the twelve barrels of Island grown McIntosh apples. of pioneer Scotch descent. He resided with his parents on the homestead until their death some years ago. He later removed to Summerside.

Education at the Lot 16 public school, the Summerside high school, and the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, Truro. Mr. MacLean entered early upon the business of farming. His two brothers, William and Alexander (deceased) took up farms of their own but the future Federal representative for Prince remained on the homestead with his parents, and was associated with his father, in general farming, including dairying, raising pure bred Holsteins and also growing registered seed grain. For a time they also operated a lobster cannery on their own farm.

An enthusiastic dairyman Alfred E. was secretary of the Lot 16 Dairying Company for a number of years. He was a prominent exhibitor at fairs at home and other parts of the Maritimes with his cattle and seed grain, and won many awards, including the John Richards cup for three years in succession for prize seed wheat, oats and barley, also the William Ewing Cup for the same products.

After his father's death about 30 years ago, Mr. MacLean continued the various activities which they carried on together.

Along other activities in which he engaged was oyster fishing at Grand River.

Fox Ranching — In the year 1912, when the boom in the fox industry was starting, Mr. MacLean built a large ranch at Lot 16. He promoted the A. E. MacLean Silver Fox Company of which he became President. Four years later, when he went to reside in Summerside, he removed his ranch to the outskirts of the town. He was also one of the promoters of the Dominion Fur Sales Ltd., which he was the first President. For a number of years he produced and sold live foxes, and continued in the industry when it got down to a pelt basis.

He was a large buyer and shipper of pelts and had important connections in London, England.

Mr. MacLean ran his first election in 1912, as one of the candidates for the Provincial Legislature for the late H. D. Doble, but went down to defeat with 27 other Liberal candidates, in the Conservative landslide.

In the next general election of 1915, he defeated Mr. Doble. In 1919 he was returned for the same seat. Dr. James Keir being his Conservative opponent.

In the fall of 1921 Mr. MacLean resigned the seat in the Legislature and accepted the nomination as Federal candidate for Prince. He was elected on December 28th by a majority of 1259 over the late Hon. James A. MacNeill, Conservative, and Hon. E. Wright, Progressive.

He was returned again in 1925 defeating G. S. Sharp by a majority of 1528. In 1926 his majority was increased to 1721, his opponent being the late Hon. J. E. Wyatt. In 1930 he defeated J. F. Arnett by a majority of 1573 and the last general election of 1935 won over the same opponent by a majority of 170.

He contested in all three provincial and five federal elections, and was only once defeated. At Summerside he was nominated, he practically all conventions he represented a party in the Legislature. He was re-nominated without opposition for Prince at the convention held during the past summer.

Mr. MacLean's substantial majorities regardless of the fate of his party in the polls were due to his popularity with all classes, and his reputation of being a devoted and energetic representative. He was easily approachable by all his constituents, and was unflinching in his courtesy and attention to their requirements.

In the House of Commons he was regarded as an able debater, particularly on subjects relating to farming and fishing, of which he had first-hand knowledge and experience.

A life-long Presbyterian, Mr. MacLean was an Elder and member of the Board of Stewards of the Presbyterian Church at Summerside. His fraternal associations were with the Masonic and Orange Orders.

A member of the Summerside Board of Trade for many years, he took active part in promoting the business interests both of the Prince County capital and the

Arrangements For Funeral Of Late Mr. MacLean

The funeral of Mr. A. E. MacLean will be held on Tuesday afternoon from his late residence to the Presbyterian Church, Summerside. The members of the Masonic order, it is understood, will hold their Masonic service at Lot 16 where Mr. MacLean resided in Summerside beginning at 1:30 p. m. and the procession will move from there to the Summerside Presbyterian Church where the funeral service will be held. Mr. MacLean's body will remain at his residence on Granville Street, Summerside, Monday and up to the time of the private house service at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday where it may be viewed by friends who wish to call. The casket will again be opened for a short time after the service in the Presbyterian Church at Summerside and for a short time in the Church at Lot 16.

The order of the procession will be as follows: Minister; members Masonic order; honorary pallbearers; active pallbearers; hearse; family mourners; the Lt. Governor B. W. something definite from the government, it was learned. On the one hand, they have been advised the best way they can serve the Allied cause is by stepping up production of foodstuffs.

On the other hand, they see the immediate result of the start of the war has been to limit the flow to the United Kingdom of most of our exports almost entirely. Cheese, Bacon and other agricultural products are being exported at prices which the farmers claim are below cost of production.

The great difficulty, as one government official explained, is that countries that compete with Canada in the United Kingdom market are able to export their goods at lower prices and Britain could hardly be expected to pay Canada relatively higher prices than Australia or New Zealand.

The official was convinced prices eventually would be adjusted upwards. In the meantime he thought it would be a mistake to hold up Canadian exports because British consumers might become accustomed to the products of other countries and Canada would not be able to re-into the market should prices advance.
