On Friday evening, July 17th, another spectacular event will take place on the harbor taking the form of a decorated and illuminated boat parade which will be participated in by every boat from the smallest to the largest on the water front.

10 HINTS FOR OLD HOME WEEK

Both auto and team drivers should read this carefully and act as it applies to respective vehicles. There is nothing expensive or elaborate and nothing that is hard to do. All roads will be greatly congested with traffic of all kinds. Traffic perhaps unprecedented so protect yourself and others for a week at least.

1. All horse drawn vehicles that will be travelling out of town should carry a light at night. This is very important. The law compels autos to do so.

2. Auto drivers should start for the city earlier and go slowly. Set an example.

3. Pay strict attention to police officers and their signals. They will assist you in protecting yourself and others.

4. Observe traffic laws regarding intersecting posts or "silent policemen." Read the signs on them.

5. Park cars and teams close to the curb and seasonal close to the vehicle ahead. Do not park on main streets. It is against the law.

6. Use legal head light lens and dim lights at all times in the city.

7. Go to the next intersection before making a complete turn. Do not turn on the middle of the block.

8. Have your brakes and horn working properly and use them judiciously.

9. Drive slowly and protect the man on the right.

10. In case of accident and injury, take the injured person to a doctor immediately, and act upon his instructions, after which report to the police.

New Annan Races

The gate set for this great annual midsummer race meet is Wednesday, August 19th. Preparations are being made for a bigger and better meeting than all of the many successful gatherings which have taken place on this now famous race course. There will be step dancing and Scottish dances in the picturesque Highland dress and all the "Simple Life" amusements which have helped to make New Annan Races famous.

The Charlottetown Military band pipe band, violin and piano will give a sweet music.
