

PROVINCIALIST IN AUTOMOBILE TOUR

The following description of a Motor Ride enjoyed by a Charlottetown girl in Victoria and suburbs on Saturday October 21st, will be found most entertaining.

In British Columbia, motor parties and motor riding is indulged in to a great extent. Many wealthy residents possess one or more private cars costing several thousands of dollars.

"The Motor ride was glorious. It was a lovely day, nice as summer. We went up Oak Bay Avenue and saw Mount Baker looking serenely across the waters. INSTITUTE MEETING.

A meeting of the Northern Institute was held on Monday night in Mayfield Hall at which Walter Simpson and Artemas Moffatt were appointed delegates to attend the Annual meeting of the Central Institute in Charlottetown on November 28th and 29th.

It was decided to hold the annual meeting of the Northern Institute in Mayfield Hall, on Monday, November 20th. After conclusion of the meeting Professor Ross addressed the meeting on the feeding of cattle, pointing out the necessity of a balance ration as essential to economical production. He spoke of the different constituents of food and the part they took in the maintenance of the warmth and muscular development of the animal and in the production of milk or of beef. Every animal should be fed in a particular way according to the work they are intended to do, while the rough products of the farm should be utilized it should be born in mind that they are generally wanting in some constituents and to get the best results these constituents in which they are wanting should be supplied from some other source. He spoke of the feeding values of straw, timothy and clover hay, turnips, oats bran oilcake and cottonseed meal and indicated the way in which to combine them to form proper ration of about

one of protein to five of the fat forming elements.

Walter Simpson, William Moffatt, Walter Buntain, Adam Brown and Artemas Moffatt took part in the discussion which followed. After a hearty vote of thanks to Professor Ross the meeting adjourned.

GIFTS TO MISSIONARY ON EVE OF RETURN TO CHINA.

A farewell reception was held at the Methodist church last evening for Miss Mary Parmenter of this town, who is about to leave for her missionary field in China, where she has spent several years of her life in forwarding the cause of Christianity.

Miss Parmenter was greeted by many friends, who wished her no end of success in her endeavors. She also received three gifts, the relief fund which had been raised here to aid the Chinese famine sufferers, a handsome silk flag from the Women's Relief corps and a bouquet of flowers from the nine missionary societies of the town.

Parmenter, Miss Parmenter's father, Rev. E. S. Robinson, Rev. Gustav A. Suber, Rev. Fred A. Moore, Rev. R. J. Mooney and Rev. George Scrivener.


As the guests entered the hall they were met by children who presented them with souvenir silk flags of China. They were then taken by the usher to the reception line, where they met the missionary. When this part of the program was completed there were brief remarks from the various clergymen. They spoke glowingly of Miss Parmenter's work in China and wished her success in her future undertakings. Mark E. Rowe spoke for Rev. J. Lee Mitchell, who was unable to be present.

Miss Parmenter gave a very interesting talk on her work in the far-away country and thanked her friends for the interest and co-operation that had been shown here. She stated that a great amount of good could be done with the funds that had been raised to help the famine sufferers.

The presentation of the relief fund was made by Edgar A. Remington, who represented the committee that had charge of the work. The silk flag was presented by the Women's Relief corps and the presidents of the nine missionary societies in town took part in the presentation of the bouquet.

An excellent feature of the program was the singing of "Onward, Christian Soldiers" by a chorus of 75 voices, the singers marching through the church. As a concluding number of the program the chorus sang "God Be With You 'Till We Meet Again."
