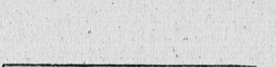

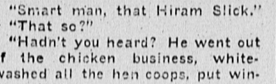

"How are the dogs?" asked Geoffrey.

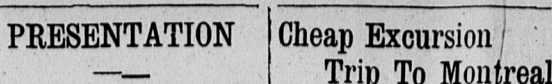
"All right, thanks." "And Sir Hugh?" "All right."

AFTON ROAD SCHOOL

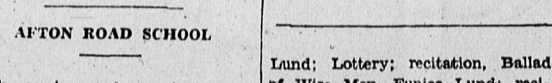

Perhaps the thing we oftenest forget about ourselves is that we are people who have at our disposal the resources of God. 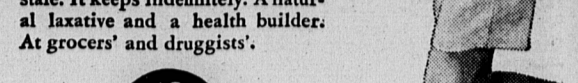

Marshmallow Fudge

Cook to the soft ball stage 2 cups sugar and 1 cup cream to which 3 tablespoons cocoa or 2 squares shaved chocolate have been added. Just before removing from heat add 1 tablespoon butter. Add 1-2 pound chopped marshmallows and 1-2 teaspoon vanilla and beat until it is thick and creamy. Pour into fancy Christmas tins, flat ones preferably, to chill and mould. These tins should be buttered very sparingly. One half cup raisins or marshmallow cherries may be added if desired.
