**"PERSONAL RECOLLECTIONS."**

The Broadway Publishing Company recently issued an unique volume entitled *Shakespeare: Personal Recollections*. It is from the pen of Col. John A. Joyce, the author of nine or ten volumes in prose and verse covering a wide range of subjects. Col. Joyce is a great admirer of Shakespeare and an unstinting eulogist as well as many eloquent passages in this volume of 300 odd pages tells us, but he is without a discriminating analyst who has drunk deeply of the Shakesperian spirit and of the spirit of the times in which the great dramatist lived. The novelty of the book is found in the assumption by the author that he was not only a contemporary, but an intimate friend and boon companion of the immortal William, who consorted with him in his youthful escapades, the changing fortunes of his earlier days, his dawning genius and his later triumphs. This method of treatment has some obvious advantages, and Col. Joyce has given a very graphic imaginative and at the same time mainly a just series of pen pictures of Shakespeare, in youth and on to the end of his career.

The book has some defects to counter-balance its better features. The principal plays of Shakespeare are liberally quoted from, in some cases analysed, and we are told something of the occasions upon which they were written. But Col. Joyce has also put into Shakespeare's mouth many things which he did not say, and accredited him with many passages which he did not write, but of which the author of the Recollections is himself the author. In so doing he has perhaps unwittingly given the reader a too vivid impression of the contrast between the genius, wit and wisdom of Shakespeare and himself. There is no living writer who

can successfully palm off his own effusions as those of the Bard of Avon. Nor it seem to have been at all necessary in a work of this kind to have rehatched the wrong of Ireland, or to have enforced so strenuously the biographer's very ardent republicanism and contempt for monarchy as Col. Joyce has done. The book is, despite these and other defects both original in its conception and interesting throughout.

It is time for those who think it a smart trick to get a liquor case witness out of the way to realise that this is an offence which can be severely punished. It would also be well for witnesses to take note that a summons to appear and give testimony may not be disobeyed with impunity. The law has not been dead, if it has sometimes slept in that regard, as one witness learned on Saturday last with vigilant prosecutors and a Magistrate who is determined to do his duty the way of transgressors of the law must be hard. Common sense should instruct them that it is better to obey the law, give up the whiskey business and turn their attention to some honest and reputable calling.
