**DEAD PILOT'S LETTER PASSES TORCH OF VICTORY CRUSADE TO CANADIANS**

TORONTO, April 5.—A letter written by a 25-year-old bomber pilot in the Royal Canadian Air Force and left with his commanding officer to be released if the pilot were killed has been received by Judge W. T. Robb of nearby Orangeville, Ont.

The pilot was Judge Robb's son, Sgt. Reg. Robb. He was shot down on a bombing raid over enemy territory last February 28.

The letter was addressed: "Dear Dad, Mother and All The Beloved Robb Family and the first paragraph said 'I can give this letter no date, as it is possible that it may never be used, but in case anything goes wrong this will be my last word to all of you.'"

"Don't feel sorry for me," it continued. "It was natural that I should answer the call of my conscience to join the service in a crusade against a barbarous enemy who threatens to annihilate mankind. I should never have been able to rest in peace for the rest of my days had I ignored the call.

"The greatest problem I had to solve was the one of the Robb family. I know that having been brought up as true Canadians the whole family would plunge into the conflict body and soul, and that there would be hearts broken.

"Was the supreme sacrifice too much to give? Not a quarter of a century ago thousands of our young men were forced to make the same decision. They held up their part bravely and died in the realization of having accomplished their goal. But the goal was not reached—it was only a lull in the storm.

"One of these nights I will climb into my plane and take off into the black. Blue pellets of light will stab out, searching frantically for the death-dealing monster that is coming to revenge those people of the horribly-scared English cities.

**Had tough Time in flight To Australia**

**Far Cry From Flying Old Crates In Mexico To New Service.**

SOMEWHERE IN NORTHERN AUSTRALIA, April 5.—(AP)—It was fifty six years ago that I had last seen Charles Baughan, an airman who navigated them, as he said, "a huge task. A new world order must be created where men can live in peace and plenty without fear or prejudice. It is up to you to see our job finally completed. No more lives must be sacrificed. Beat your swords into ploughshares. Preach the gospel of Peace on Earth, Good-Will Toward Men." Never again allow the rivers of our world to run red with the blood of our youth. I am depending on you to aid in this movement.

"I will say a prayer for these people. But after all a mad dog must be exterminated. Horrible vengeance will be meted out to those who aided the destruction of some of my best friends.

"Suddenly there will be a horrible crash.—We've had it! A lucky hit—or perhaps I should say an unlucky hit. . . . I am not afraid. To you who are left behind is a task—a huge task. A new world order must be created where men can live in peace and plenty without fear or prejudice. It is up to you to see our job finally completed. No more lives must be sacrificed. Beat your swords into ploughshares. Preach the gospel of Peace on Earth, Good-Will Toward Men." Never again allow the rivers of our world to run red with the blood of our youth. I am depending on you to aid in this movement.

**Woman to head Oldest Daily In New York**

NEW YORK, April 5.—(AP)—A dark-haired hazel-eyed woman of 39, mother of three children and an active worker for social reform, is the new publisher of New York's oldest daily newspaper.

The fact she is assuming the helm of the New York Post at a time when the paper is taking one of its most adventurous steps since Alexander Hamilton founded it 141 years ago excites rather than disturbs its new boss—Mrs. George Backer.

That step is the conversion from standard to tabloid size beginning tomorrow. The Post for several weeks has published a tabloid edition on Saturdays only. It published in tabloid form for a few weeks in 1934 and then returned to regular size.

Mrs. Backer said she was "a little afraid" intellectuals might feel it a vulgarization to present the news in tabloid.

"I know that's not so," she smiled. "We are keeping all the regular features and services, and the policy will be the same as under my husband."

Specially, she said, the policy will be "liberal, independent, and not pro or anti anything" except anti-Nazi and anti-Fascist.

Mrs. Backer took over the job as publisher Saturday after her husband, George Backer, resigned as president and editor because of prolonged ill health.

No newspaper tycoon, Mrs. Backer, granddaughter of Jacob H. Schiff, banker philanthropist, has served as vice president and treasurer of the Post since she and her husband acquired the paper in 1936 from J. David Stern.

"Taking the recent Victory Loan as an example, Mr. Barbour said that about one-half the bond issue was purchased by about 300 big companies. And we don't know how much other money they had in their vaults besides the loan. That's the trouble is today he added.

"If we could create in Canada a system whereby more of the money was going each week to the farmers, the fishermen and the working people, we would be doing something towards solving the problem. It is up to all governments, federal and provincial, to study how to bring about better conditions, he said. If we cannot create in Canada conditions where more money will go to the working people, then something has got to happen.

If we can raise the income of the farmer we shall have gone a long way toward relieving unemployment and putting the country on a sound basis, he said.

In closing he said a great work is being done and there is work for everyone to have a share in defeating the greatest enemy that civilization has ever met with.
