Montreal to Have "Timely" Gathering

MONTREAL, Jan. 31.—Montreal is to have a "timely" gathering next week when some 150 watch inspectors of the Canadian National Railways whose places of business are from Halifax to Vancouver meet here in their annual convention.

The meeting will be in connection with the annual gathering of the Canadian Jewellers Association which meets on February 8th, 9th and 10th under the presidency of Mr. J. A. Caron of Montreal.

The jewellers gathering will bring to Montreal watch inspectors of the Canadian National system from all parts of Canada and their work in safeguarding the time appliances which figure so importantly in the operating of railway trains will be discussed from all angles while they are here.

A bounty of fifteen dollars a head has been granted by the Provincial government for all bears killed and permission to kill the animals throughout the year has been granted.

C. N. R. Exhibit

MONTREAL, Jan. 31.—Canada's attractions for the hunter, fishermen and lovers of the out of doors are being graphically illustrated in thousands of persons attending the New England sportsmen's show at Boston this week and in the first three days of the show which opened on Friday more than 20,000 people have viewed the exhibit of the Canadian National Railways which occupies a prominent place in the Mechanics Building where the show is being held.

The Canadian National exhibit includes mounted game animals and birds representative of the different provinces of the Dominion, mounted fish panoramic views of the hunting and fishing territories across the Dominion to officials of the company who returned this morning from Boston. At no time during the first three days of the show were there less than five hundred people massed in the aisle to see the exhibit. Motion pictures, hunting, fishing and winter sports in the Canadian woods are being shown during the show and the exhibit is in charge of Ed. Poole, fish and game representative of the general tourist department of the National system.
