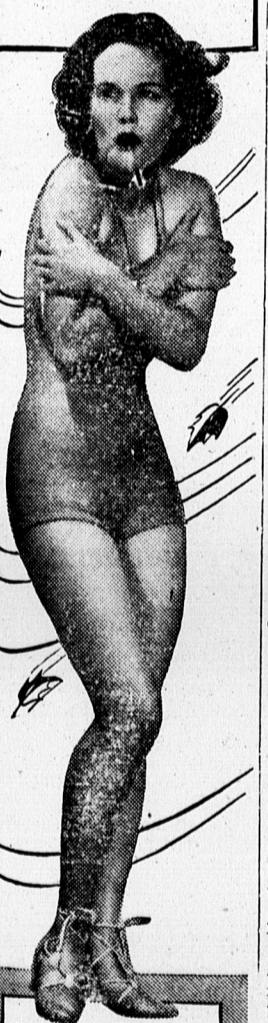

IN MEMORIAM

MR. BENJAMIN GRAHAM

On October 16th the people of Sturgeon and surrounding districts were grieved to hear of the death of Benjamin Graham in the P. E. Island Hospital.

Mr. Graham was ill for eleven weeks at his home in Sturgeon before he was removed to the P. E. I. Hospital where he died just eight days later on October 16, 1936. During his long illness at home he was lovingly attended by his wife and daughters. All that loving care and medical skill could do was done but of no avail. It was hoped that when he was removed to the P. E. I. Hospital that he would recover but death came as a blessed relief after weeks of suffering and he was ready to go.

Benjamin Graham was born at Beach Point 55 years ago and moved to Sturgeon about 17 years ago. He was a splendid worker, always so cheerful and kind hearted and a good friend to any one sick or in trouble. He was a member of the Sturgeon Baptist Church and sang in its choir and the Sturgeon United Choir for years and will be greatly missed here and in the surrounding districts where he always took an active part in any benevolent work.

Especially will he be missed in the home. He leaves to mourn their loss his wife, Bixy Davey, and two daughters, namely Elizabeth (Mrs. Cecil Hickey) and Hattie (Mrs. George Stewart) both of Sturgeon; also an aged father, Lot Graham of Halifax and one brother, Spurgeon of Halifax and Frank and Winnie half brother

and sister of Gladstone, P. E. I. His brother Spurgeon from Halifax and Frank and Winnie of Gladstone attended the funeral. One son Wally predeceased him about 18 years ago.

The funeral was one of the largest ever seen in this section of the Province and took place from his daughter's Mrs. Cecil Dickens to the Sturgeon Baptist Church

where the service was held. Rev. Mr. Flannigan conducted the service. The hymns sung were his favorite and requests were, at the house "Our souls are in His Mighty Hands" and at the church "The Lord's My Shepherd, There'll be no Shadows. I know that my Redeemer Liveth and Will the Circle be unbroken. The floral tributes were many and beautiful and

speaks well of the respect and esteem in which the deceased was held in the community.

The pall bearers were Messrs. Willie Farrell, John M. Kearney, Earl Llewellyn, Murdoch King, Dan Stewart and Richard Llewellyn. Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord. (Patriot and Halifax papers please copy).
