MILLION BRITISHERS REJECTED FOR DEFECTS.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—England's splendid sanitation and the unprecedented healthfulness of the British army is a saving feature in England's status in the present war, according to a statement by Sir James Crichton-Browne, an eminent medical authority, before the Sanitary Inspectors Association today.

"With a larger army in the field than ever before," said the speaker, "the percentage of disease is lower than in times of peace."

Sir James called attention to the fact that although a million men had been rejected for physical defects during the first year of the war, these men had all been born from 18 to 40 years ago in the days of imperfect sanitation, when disease was prevalent and went unchecked.

The Battery's New Quarters

A look round the Artillerymen's new quarters in the Agricultural Building yesterday revealed a scene of bustle and activity. There still remains a good deal of work to be done, especially in the way of lavatory accommodation, but a few days will see a vast difference in this respect. There are two main entrances outside one of which the sentry box is stationed. A long section of the interior on the left is occupied by the men's sleeping quarters which, at the end of the platform and are partitioned off from the main hall. Two long ranges of berths, upper and lower, divided into sections of 16 berths, run from one end of the hall to the other. Each man has his own berth. There was some good fun last evening when the men turned in, but they are all in love with their new quarters, which are very comfortable. Big base burners stand here and there at intervals, besides which there is a complete heating plant with pipes which run everywhere, so it will be seen that the men will be very snug. At the end of the sleeping quarters is the big dining hall, across which stretch long tables and forms. Close by are the stores and the canteen, where a good supply of soft drinks, biscuits, tobacco and cigarettes, etc., is always on hand. The cook-house is equipped with three ranges and an efficient staff of cooks. The amount of beef cut up for consumption in this department in a day is something prodigious.

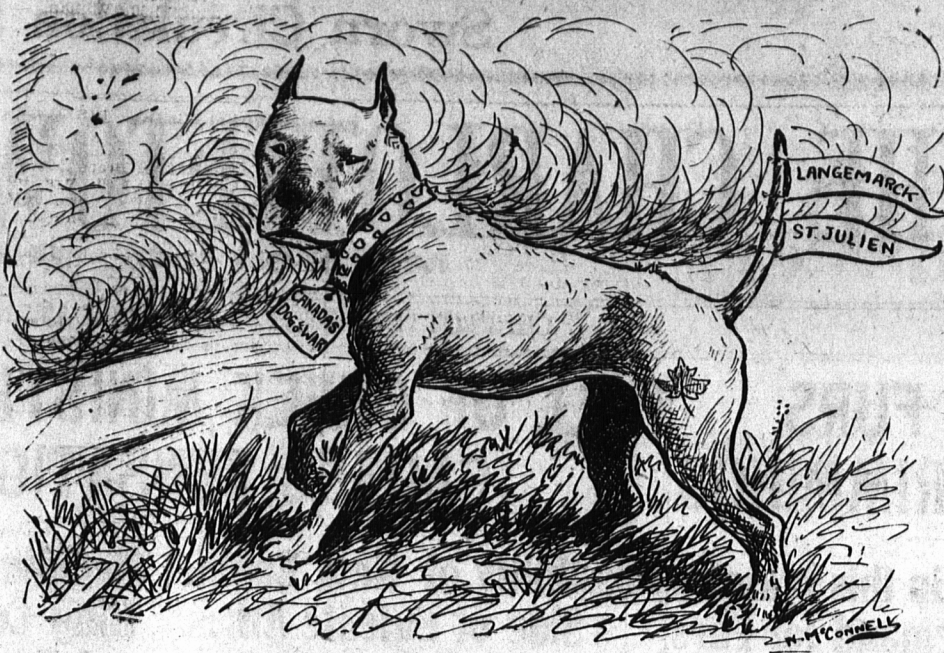
The wash room is large and roomy and has two long, inclined zinc-lined troughs with a double row of hot and cold water taps over them. The walls are wood lined below and fibre board panelling above.

The lavatory accommodation occupies two large rooms and a large steam boiler and stove stand at one end. The plumbers are busy fitting in the necessary sanitary equipment with all speed.

The four sleeping apartments will accommodate respectively 76, 80 and 32 men while the N. S. O.'s quarters upstairs will accommodate sixteen.

The mess-room so far does duty as a recreation room in the evenings. A wide staircase on the right of the entrance leads up to the long gallery which runs alongside the upper sleeping rooms and administration offices. The latter are situated at the top of the stairs and here all the candidates for enlistment or other inquiries may see the officers in charge. Another long row of berths stretches nearly to the end of the hall. The men are now drilling in the Arena just across the street, and every man Jack is looking and feeling very fit.
