Leafs Have Edge In 1-0 Victory Over Rangers After 1 All Tie

TORONTO, Nov. 12 (CP)—It goes without saying that Manager Conny Smythe got more satisfaction than his arch-rival, Lester Patrick, from the 1-1 overtime tie in the Toronto Leafs played with New York Rangers here Saturday night. For the Leafs' scorer was Billy Taylor, who got his first goal in his second game in the National Hockey League.

It was only last spring that the silver-haired Patrick characterized Billy the kid as the greatest junior he had seen in 20 years. The remark was made as the brisky young blond leading Ottawa Generals to a Canadian Junior championship and the Memorial Cup.

The Rangers' mentor, no doubt, recalled his remarks as Taylor, who tied in a second period goal to tie the score and cheat the Broadway blue shirt of their first 1939 victory. Taylor's tally canceled one scored by Neil Colville in the first.

The tie netted the Leafs their third point of their young season. They beat Boston in their first start. Rangers, on the other hand, have yet to win a game, their opening game against Detroit also ended in a 1-1 deadlock.

Colville got his goal as his team was short-handed Babe Pratt drawing a penalty for tripping Sy Apps. The Leafs had stormed by Apps, hitting the Ranger center for one full minute when Alex Shibicky whacked the puck out of danger and into Leaf territory.

Bing Kampanen went into the corner for the puck, passing it out to Apps. The Leafs' centre was dumped again that time and the puck was free until Mac Colville grabbed it and relayed it to his brother, who slid it along the ice and into an open corner of the net.

The game had all the zip of other Leaf-Ranger clashes and alternately thrilled and awed the crowd of 11,327.

Wally Stanowski, rockle Leaf defenseman and Capt. Red Horner, went pay for the Leafs. Stanowski chopped a home in one ankle in a workout and is expected to be out for three weeks. Horner is only now returning into shape after being hospitalized during the training season.

Football Upset As Notre Dame Is Defeated

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 (CP)—After keeping company with them all season the luck of the Irish deserted Notre Dame's gridiron warriors Saturday and the Ramblers went down 7-6 before Iowa Hawkeyes for their first defeat of the year and one of the biggest upsets in the United States college football campaigns.

Also toppled from the unbeaten list were Dartmouth, Kentucky and Boston Catholic. A half-dozen other favorites also bit the dust in a big upheaval of form.

Dartmouth, hailed as Cornell's only real rival in the Ivy League, bowed to Princeton 9-7 while Kentucky's Wildcats dropped a 13-6 decision to Georgia Tech and Catholic was whipped by St. Anselm's 39-13.

Tennessee, Tulane, North Carolina, Cornell, Oklahoma and Texas A. and M. all remained unbeaten. Texas A. and M. barely got past Southern Methodist 6-2 and Cornell stopped Colgate's Red Raiders 14-12. Oklahoma shaded Kansas State 13-10 while Tennessee whipped Tulane 34-0 and North Carolina pushed over Davidson 32-0. Harry Hayes' 69-yard run helped Tulane to a 13-0 victory over Alabama.

University Of Western Ontario Wins Senior Title

MONTREAL, Nov. 12 (CP)—University of Western Ontario clinched the Senior Intercollegiate Football Title at Kingston Saturday, when they came from behind to down Queen's University 13-8. University of Toronto rode to an easy 19-7 victory over McGill.

In the Big Four, Montreal Royals pulled a surprise out of the bag by holding the Dominion Champion Toronto Argonauts to a 6-6 tie, while Ottawa Rough Riders pounded out a 25-7 win over Hamilton Tigers. Montreal Westmounts downed Peterborough 20-1 in the Ontario Rugby Football Union, and Sarnia Imperials defeated Bahy Beach 7-3 to march into the playoffs against Westmounts.

Out in the west, Calgary Bronks scored an upset victory over Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the first of a two-game total-score playoff series for the Western crown. Bronks downed last year's Western Champions 13-7 at Winnipeg.

U. S. Army Team Wins Horse Trophy

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 (CP)—The United States army team won the International military perpetual challenge trophy Saturday night as the National horse show came to a close.

The American's Captain R. A. Drake of Dakota, Lieutenant Franklin win on Sir Conrad and Lieutenant Frank Henry on Renzo, scored by 12 faults over the hazardous 12-jump course. The Chilean team was second and the Mexican team, third. The trophy was won last year by the Irish army team, which did not defend.

Red Wings Hand Bruins Second Defeat

DETROIT, Nov. 12—Detroit Red Wings handed the world champion Boston Bruins their second straight defeat of the National Hockey League season tonight winning 2-1 in a tight game.

It was Detroit's first victory of the year and the team's initial triumph over the Bruins since the 1937-38 campaign.

Hawks Win Over Amerks; Desilets' Goal

CHICAGO, Nov. 12 (CP)—Joe Joffe Desilets' second goal of the game in the final minute of play gave Chicago Black Hawks a 2-1 victory over New York Americans in a National Hockey League game tonight.

The Hawks, rebuilt from the cellar outfit of last season, moved to the front early in the second period on Desilets' first goal, a long distance shot from behind the blue line. The puck hit goalie Earl Robertson's skate and skidded into the net.

Ramblers Win In 3rd Period Rally

CLEVELAND, Nov. 12—A third-period rally produced three goals for Philadelphia Ramblers here Saturday night, but it wasn't enough and Cleveland Barons won an International American League hockey game 5-4.

Victorias Pedal To Win In Bike Race

CHICAGO, Nov. 12 (CP)—Turning on the power in the closing hour, the Victoria, B. C., brother team of Torchy and Doug Peden pedaled to victory in Chicago's 42nd six-day bike race which ended at midnight Saturday.

Before a crowd of 11,000, the Canadians finished a lap ahead of their closest rivals. It was Torchy's 34th triumph, a record in modern bike history, and the sixth time he has been victorious with brother Doug as a teammate.

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Bookies Take Kick In Pants At Chicago

CHICAGO, Nov. 10—The bookies suffered another kick in the professional pants today.

U. S. District Attorney William J. Campbell announced that the Illinois Bell Telephone Company had agreed to disconnect private telephones in every horse playing parlor in Chicago. He estimated about 700 would be affected.

He made the statement 24 hours after the telephone company cut off leased wires linking Illinois betting rooms to the Chicago bureau of M. L. Annenberg's national horse racing information service. That action deprived the handbooks of the entry lists, shifting odds, results and payoff prices that had received from the tracks via the Annenberg network.

Campbell's new move was aimed at further isolation to the bookmakers. He told reporters his investigation has ascertained that after the normal channels of racing day bookies obtained the names of the winners and payoff figures by

Revenge Sweet For Gladstones In Semi-finals

OTTAWA, Nov. 12 (CP)—Revenge was sweet for Gladstones Saturday as the Ottawa Junior football champions topped Montreal Westmounts 14-5 in a sudden-death eastern Canada semi-final game.

The teams battled for a final berth with the Toronto and Hamilton district winners but there was more to it than that for Gladstones as they roared up from behind in the second half to win. Just a year ago, Westmounts smothered in the 1938 edition of Gladstones in a similar playoff here.

Australia Lowers Industries Protection

In general, Canadian products have not been seriously affected by the tariff amendments announced in the Australian Commonwealth health budget for 1939-1940, but a number of changes in respect of intermediate and general tariff rates may be of interest to Canadian manufacturers from the standpoint of competitive prices. In advising the Department of Trade and Commerce of this, L. M. Cosgrave, Canadian Trade Commissioner at Sydney, states that "it is of interest to note that the Government stated that the Australian woolen manufacturing industry is now sufficiently established to function with lower protective duties than at present recorded although imported cloths under the new duties will still land at costs higher than the domestic selling prices of comparable materials of Australian manufacture. The recent establishment in Australia of mills for the spinning of cotton condenser and cotton cocoon yarns for use in towel manufacture has resulted in the imposition of protective duties on these yarns. Correspondingly, an increase appears in the duties on towels to offset the higher duties on these condenser yarns required for the manufacture of coloured towels."

"It was further contended by the Government that industries which have been assisted by high tariffs during early years of production should have acquired a standard of efficiency over the years to permit them, when fully established, to function satisfactorily under lower protective duties."

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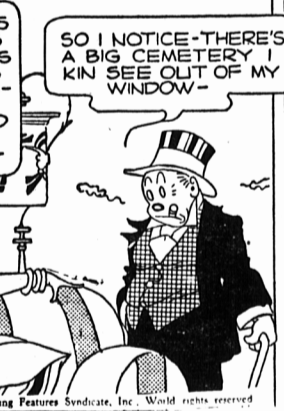
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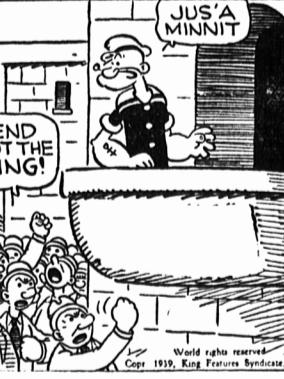
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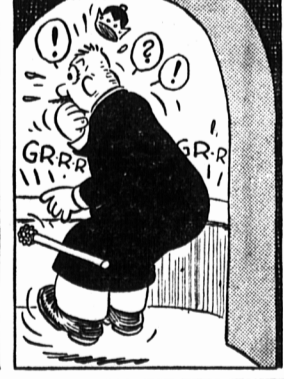
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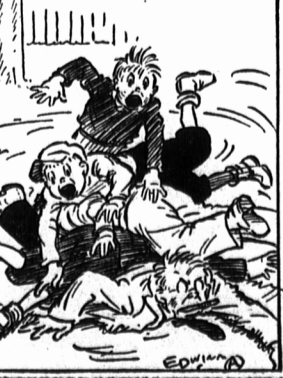
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
