NOT AN INSINUATION.

The Examiner pretends that we have by insinuation misrepresented its attitude toward prohibitory and restrictive laws. Let us see. Here is a single sentence from an article in its issue of the 10th instant:

"Prohibitory laws may be passed as a sort of public protest against the evils they prohibit; but for the lessening of those evils they are, at present, useless,—and we have no right to expect that cigarette-smoking by the boys will be lessened by the passage of a law with that intent."

This sentence is entirely in accord with the purport of what precedes and follows in the article referred to. It is entirely in accord with the Examiner's deliverances in many articles during months and years past. It proclaims that all prohibitory laws are "useless," ought never to have been enacted, and by inevitable inference that they ought to be repealed. Pushed to its legitimate conclusion the sentence above quoted from The Examiner would sweep away the entire penal code of Canada, of all countries, and sweep away the Decalogue as well. We do not deal in insinuations. Let the Examiner answer, explain, or abide by its own clear statements.

Mr. T. C. James in a letter to the Patriot makes the artful but rather astounding statement that "No towns in Canada or Great Britain with the population and telegraphic business of towns in P. E. Island have a commercial day and night and Sunday service." A hundred of towns in Great Britain and Canada with less population than Charlottetown have day and night and Sunday telegraph service. No doubt they have also more telegraph business, due to the fact of low rates, keeping their offices open, and encouraging rather than discouraging business as is done here. Mr. James' statement has a "catch" in it which it was probably not intended that the ordinary reader would detect.

We are glad to notice that the matter of water supply and sewerage for Summerside, which was much discussed and warmly advocated in THE GUARDIAN some years ago, is again engaging public attention.

Prize Fighter Indicted

HOCKEY AT RINK

Vics Defeat Former Champions 5-0.

2ND CRYSTALS VICTORS

Easily Defeating the 2nd Victorias by a Score of 7-3.

There was a very large attendance at the Rink last night to witness the struggle between the Crystals of Summerside and Victorias of Charlottetown in the second match of the series for the championship and trophy.

Referee McMillan was promptly on the ice at the hour announced for the first match, but the holders of reserved seats were late in taking their places, thus delaying the game for 15 minutes. Owing to the soft weather the ice was in very poor condition and the First Crystals attribute their defeat largely to the heavy ice.

At 8:15 Worth and Cushing faced off and for the next twenty minutes the play was very fast, Worth scoring the first goal for the Victorias shortly after commencement of play. Shortly afterwards Brehaut landed the puck in the net. Play being resumed Worth again scored after making a brilliant run. This ended the scoring for the first half. Score 3-0 in favour of Vics.

In the second half the play was somewhat slower, the snow on the ice handicapping the players very heavily. After about fifteen minutes play Worth again landed the puck in the net, scoring another goal for the Vics. The Crystals then made matters lively for the Vics rushing the puck several times dangerously near their goal, but owing to the excellent defence which Sprague, Smith and Gaudet put up, they failed to score. Shortly before the bell sounded for time Worth again scored another for the Vics which ended the scoring. Time being called the score stood as follows: Vics 5, Crystals 0.

At 9:55 the second Crystals and second Victorias appeared to try conclusions for Intermediate honors. Weeks of the Vics and Allen of the Crystals commenced the game. After playing for about fifteen minutes Clarke of the Crystals succeeded in scoring for his team. Shortly after McKenzie repeated the trick for the Crystals thus making the score 2-0 in favor of the Crystals, but Weeks, not to be outdone, succeeded in scoring one for the Vics. The half ended without further score.

Play being resumed McKenzie again scored. He was quickly followed by Mabon, making the score 3-2 in favor of the Crystals. McKenzie and Picketts added two more to the credit of the Summerside players. After a clever run Collins scored for the Vics. From a scrimmage in front of the Vics' goal the Crystals forced the puck into the net, thus making the score 6-3 in favor of the Crystals. McDonald by an excellent run from cover scored again and when the bell sounded the score stood 7-3 in favor of Crystals.

Both Summerside teams played excellent games.
