PROGRESS OF THE WAR

ALLIES JOIN FORCES

BRUSSELS, Aug. 10.--Belgian Official reports received at the War Office record the important fact that junction has been effected by the Belgian British and French troops across the line of the German advance through Belgium. The location of the troops of the three armies has not been revealed, but in any future operation it is understood they will not act together.

ANOTHER GERMAN INVASION

But Troops Prepare for Ret ent.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 10.--Forty-six thousand German troops that had concentrated at Esch in the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg invaded France to-day. Before moving across the frontier they had felled trees and dug trenches for temporary fortification, upon which they might fall back if repulsed.

A large party of the invading force was cavalry that had been taken to Esch and disembarked upon platforms 1,200 feet long that had been hurriedly constructed.

FRENCH SEIZE GERMAN AEROPLANE FACTORY

PARIS, Aug. 10.--The capture of Mulhausen resulted in the French seizing an aeroplane factory operated by a noted German manufacturer.

BIG FIGHT PENDING

War Office advices to-day indicate a big engagement is pending between French and German troops in Lorraine below Saarburg. Baccaret reports hearing cannonading in the direction of Montigny. It is believed the French artillery are supporting an attacking column, engaging Germans advancing from Saarburg.

LARGE OFFICER CASUALTY LIST

During the fierce fighting of the last few days, says a despatch to the Daily Telegraph from Brussels, a large number of officers as compared with privates were disabled, owing to their distinctive uniforms. A great many surgeons in particular fell.

AUSTRIA'S INTENTIONS

A peremptory demand was made on the Austrian Ambassador by the French Foreign Office to-day for a statement of Austria's intentions in the present war situation. The Ambassador protested that he was without instructions.

RUSSIANS INVADE AUSTRIA

Defeat Austrians

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 10.--The Russian Minister of War, M. Soukhomlinoff, announced to-day that Russian troops had entered Austria through Styria Valley and defeated a large Austrian force that attempted to resist their advance.

RUSSIAN AEROPLANE BROUGHT TO EARTH

LONDON, Aug. 10.--A party of English women, who have just come through Galicia, tell stories of a Russian aeroplane dropping bombs on a small town near Cracow.

Two Russian officers were in the aeroplane, which was built for three persons. The vacant space was filled with bombs. After the aviators had done considerable damage with their missiles the Austrians succeeded in bringing down the aeroplane with a field gun. The two officers, who were wounded, were taken prisoners.

THE PRINCE JOINS THE COLORS

LONDON, Aug. 10.--The Prince of Wales left Buckingham Palace at six o'clock this morning to join the battalion of the Grenadier Guards to which he has been assigned. He is stationed at Wellington Barracks, Brentwood.

ENTHUSIASTIC ENLISTMENT

LONDON, Aug. 10.--The receiving office through the country is besieged by men desirous of joining the colors in response to an appeal from Earl Kitchener that he wanted 100,000 at once. The streets of London assume the appearance of a military post. The appeal of a military Wales for funds to relieve distress has already resulted in the splendid sum of two million dollars being subscribed.

GERMANS ATTACK MAIN FLEET

Only Result in the Sinking of a German Submarine

LONDON, Aug. 10.--The Admiralty announced that one of the Cruiser Squadrons of the main fleet was attacked yesterday by German submarines. Some of the British ships were damaged. One German submarine boat was sunk. No details are given as to the place at which the fight occurred.

EX-EMPRESS EUGENIE'S GENEROSITY

Ex-Empress Eugenie of France to-day sent to the Queen-Mother Alexandra a subscription of \$1,000 for Red Cross work.

CANADA TO VOTE SEVENTY-FIVE MILLIONS

When Parliament Meets Sir R. Borden Will Ask for a Vote of \$75,000,000 to be Spent on Behalf of Great Britain's Defence

OTTAWA, Aug. 10.--Parliament which meets on August 16th will be asked to legalize acts by the Government since the emergency arose. It will also be asked to vote an amount said to be 75 million for expenditure in Great Britain.

BATTLESHIP ON FIRE

LONDON, Aug. 10.--A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Rome says a message from Ancona, Italy, reports battleship in fire has been sighted drifting toward Pola Naval Port, Austria, Adriatic. The nationality could not be determined.

GERMAN CRUISER IN AMERICAN PORT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.--It is reported by the State Department that the German Cruiser Karlsruhe put into San Juan Porto Rico to-day for coal. She will be permitted to take enough on board to see her to Bremen when she will be forced to leave that port. It is thought that she will see her home port.

GERMANY IN THE ORIENT

TOKIO, Aug. 10.--A German fleet at Tsing Tau has already seized the Russian steamer Riazan, carrying British subjects, and driven one hundred merchantmen to the refuge of Japanese ports and embarrassed the entire Japanese shipping in the Orient.

CANADIAN JAPANESE FORCE

VANCOUVER, Aug. 10.--"The Canadian News," a Japanese newspaper of Vancouver, issued an extra calling the Japanese here either to go home and join their Regiments or form a Regiment in Vancouver to fight under the direction of the Government of Canada.

CANADIAN BLACK SQUAD

Forty-five colored men have enlisted in a proposed Imperial Black Regiment of 200 men in Montreal.

HEBREW REGIMENT

TORONTO, Aug. 10.--The first detachment of men who are to man the Niobe left here to-day for Halifax. The detachment consisted principally of first-class stokers.

QUEBEC, Aug. 10.--An I. C. R. man guarding a railway bridge shot and killed a trespasser below.

CANADA'S FOOD GIFT

OTTAWA, Aug. 10.--The cost of the Canadian contribution to the motherland of 2,000,000 bags flour will be \$2,800,000. Parliament will be asked next week to vote the necessary funds. To transport this immense quantity of flour will require two hundred trains and a fleet of ships.

GERMAN CRUISER AT SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.--The German cruiser Lipsig is reported hanging around outside to convoy the coast German oil tankers and to intercept British coal steamers presumably to replenish her supply of coal.

GERMAN SPIES IN HALIFAX

HALIFAX, Aug. 10.--Arrested as German spies, one giving the name of "Oldenburg," a plumber, doing business in Halifax, and another named Manchester, of Eastern Passage, are behind the bars at police headquarters. Oldenburg is of German descent but has been in Canada attached to the German Navy but since his escape from it has been living on Canadian soil. He says he has no desire to return to Germany. Manchester was living in Eastern Passage for some time and was caught surprised when, Saturday afternoon, returning home from the city a military scout picked him up as a spy.

LARGE NUMBER OF SUICIDES

PARIS, Aug. 10.--It is announced that the list of German suicides in France has been increased by the death of several women who became despondent because they were under the necessity of leaving the country.

ATHENS, Aug. 10.--Large Turkish forces are concentrated on Bulgarian soil near Perekop, in the vicinity of the River Maritza. They are moving apparently in the direction of the frontier of Thrace and Bulgaria by agreement with Bulgaria.

BRITISH COMMONS HAS ADJOURNED

LONDON, Aug. 10.--On moving the adjournment of the House of Commons for a fortnight, Premier Asquith this evening intimated that he was hopeful that in the interval he might be able to make proposals regarding Irish Home Rule which would meet with something like general acquiescence on the solution of the question.

WOMAN SHOT BY GERMANS

ROME, Aug. 10.--A despatch states that the Germans have shot Madame Favere on the ground that she was caught in the act of attempting to blow up the bridge near Leopoldo with the object of embarrassing German troops.

FLAGS NECESSARY

A small Welsh coal steamer tried to enter Queenstown Harbor last night during a dense fog. When the lights challenged her, the Captain being unable to answer owing to the absence of signal flags aboard, the forts immediately fired and the vessel fled to Voucha before a fusillade of shots. The moral is: Buy the necessary bunting.

JAPAN GETTING RESTLESS

LONDON, Aug. 10.--A despatch from Tokio says an all-night Cabinet conference and activity in the Navy Department has strengthened the popular belief that Japan is about to take an active part in the war. A pronouncement by the Government is hourly expected.
