Lacopia won the free-for-all at Halifax this week, beating out Frank Patch, the Grand Circuit performer of a year or two ago, and other good ones.

A feature of the meeting at the Iowa State Fair meeting at Des Moines, was a trotting race under saddle, in which California B., 2:15 1/2, stepped a mile in 2:14 1/2.

Slippery Bill got away with the 2:40 class, at Munroe, Me., the other day. The race went four heats, the first of which was won by Blanche Wilkes. The best time was 2:24 1/2.

When a Game of Chance got away with the third heat of the free-for-all at St. Stephen the other day in 2:13 1/2, he established a new record for the track. The old record was 2:14 1/2.

Kentuckians expect the two-year-old pacer Poorman, who recently equalled the record of 2:07, for his age and grit, to touch 2:06 this fall. He is by The Northern Man, 2:06 1/2, out of Mary Lloyd, by Vice Commodore, 2:11.

Rush Canadian Troops to England

(Canadian Press Despatch) OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—According to the rate of which battalions are now being sent overseas, there will not be more than about sixty thousand troops left in Canada at the beginning of the winter, although this number will, of course, be considerably augmented as recruiting goes on.

In addition to this reason for sending the troops overseas this fall, there is the further reason that they will then be immediately available in the spring for movement to the front for what is hoped will be the final big offensive. It is probable that a number of the towns throughout the Dominion which benefitted from having military units quartered there during last winter will this year be small unit system has been abandoned, and most of the troops will be concentrated in a few large centres.

RELIEF IN BELGIUM TO BE AUGMENTED.

LONDON, Sept. 20.—The Commission for Relief in Belgium announces that arrangements have been completed with all the interested governments for the augmentation during the coming year of the relief to be provided to the 2,200,000 civil population in the occupied provinces of northern France. The steady exhaustion of food reserves and the diminishing vitality of the population have necessitated a considerable increase in the ration hitherto provided, especially for the industrial populations in the Lille and Valenciennes districts. The Allied governments have facilitated financial arrangements by which the monthly resources of the Commission, exclusively for the French population, are to be increased from \$3,400,000 a month to \$5,000,000 a month. This sum will be used to provide increased imports from overseas and from Holland.

Food for Flanders.

Negotiations are not yet completed as to the food supply and finance for the two other political divisions occupied by the German army which the Commission looks after, that is, first, the two Flanders, with a population of 1,700,000 people, which is under the German General Staff, and with regard to which, like northern France the Commission deals directly with the General Staff, and, second, the remaining part of Belgium, which is under General von Blasing, which is under 760,000 people.

GEN. HUGHES ON OCEAN ON HIS WAY HOME?

OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—It is freely rumored in Ottawa that General Sir Sam Hughes is on the ocean on his way back to Canada. There is no confirmation, but it is generally believed that he had made arrangements to sail to day or tomorrow. What gives strength to the report of his departure is that there has been no news in the cable regarding the Minister of Militia for a few days.

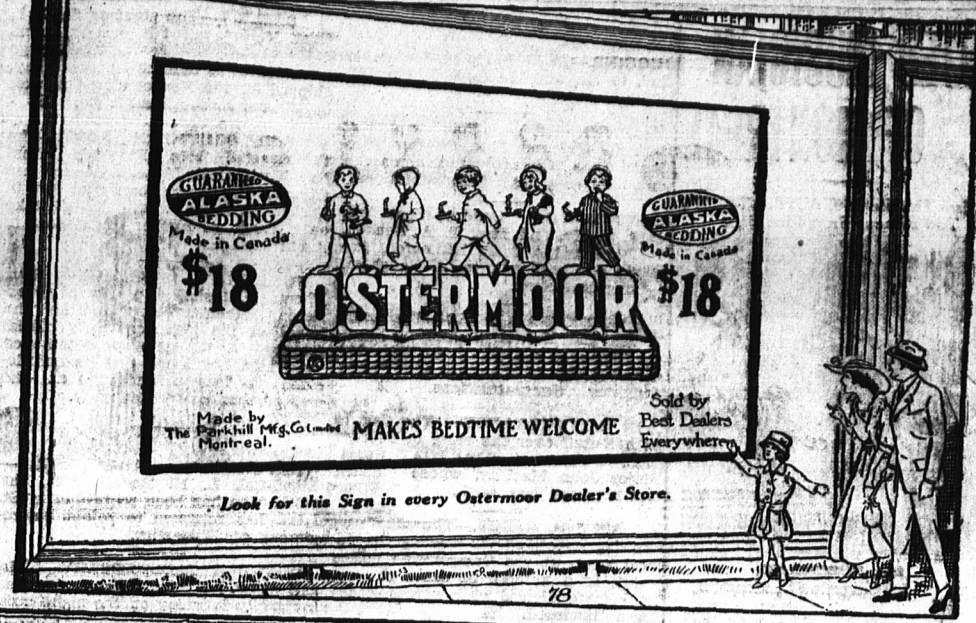
The total allotment of bonds of this issue will be limited to one hundred million dollars exclusive of the amount (if any) paid for by the surrender of bonds as the equivalent of cash under the terms of the War Loan prospectus of 22nd November, 1915.

The instalments may be paid in full on the 16th day of October, 1916, or on any instalment due date thereafter, under discount at the rate of four per cent per annum. All payments are to be made to a chartered bank for the credit of the Minister of Finance. Failure to pay any instalment when due will render previous payments liable to forfeiture and the allotment to cancellation.

Subscriptions, accompanied by a deposit of ten per cent of the amount subscribed, must be forwarded through the medium of a chartered bank. Any branch in Canada of any chartered bank will receive subscriptions and issue provisional receipts.

This loan is authorized under Act of the Parliament of Canada, and both principal and interest will be a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund. Forms of application may be obtained from any branch in Canada of any chartered bank and at the office of any Assistant Receiver General in Canada. Subscriptions must be for even hundreds of dollars.
