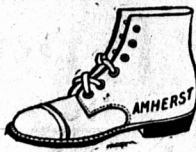

HEADLESS WOMAN MYSTERY STILL UNSOLVED.

WOONSOCKET, R. I., July 27.—Henri Deslovers, who is being held for the alleged murder of Angele Parmentier, was arraigned in court again today for a preliminary hearing. The man strenuously maintains that he is guiltless of the crime charged against him. Beyond the arrest of Deslovers on circumstantial evidence, the authorities have apparently made little progress towards

unraveling the mystery surrounding the murder of the Parmentier woman, who headless and nude body was found in the Blackwater river more than a month ago. The man had lived with the woman and because he was reported to have been in her company when she was lost seen alive on June 4. Where and how the murder was committed have not been determined. Every effort of the police to discover the head of the murdered woman has likewise proved futile.
