

Monarchs Take Both Games Of Twin Bill From Summerside Team

The Philadelphia Monarchs swept both ends of a doubleheader from the Summerside All-Stars yesterday, winning the afternoon game 11 to 2 and taking the nightcap 7 to 2.

The visitors collected 17 hits off two Summerside pitchers in the afternoon, getting 12 hits in 6 2-3 innings off Daley, and 5 hits in 5 1-3 innings off Williams. The locals rapped out a total of nine safe singles off Lowery, the big Philadelphia pitcher. Scott, and Banks, outfielders, and Solomon, catcher, were the big guns for the Monarchs. Scott getting four for five, Banks three for five and Solomon three for four.

Les Gaudet and Hank Landry excelled with the three for the All-Stars. Gaudet getting three for five and Landry two for five.

The game was played in a high wind that swept from the home plate towards the outfield and was thus made to order for the boys with the shillelachs. Much sagged fielding was in evidence, the Philadelphia colored boys making seven errors, and our locals kicking the ball around on five different occasions.

Grady's pick-up of Landry's throw into the dirt to nip Banks in the third inning was the fielding feature of the contest.

Second Game

The evening contest was a much better game to watch, and both hits and errors were less in evidence. Joe Bernard starting for the locals, held the visitors in check for four innings, but the colored lads bunched four hits in the fifth of his slants, and these coupled with one walk and one error at short field resulted in five runs. They got to Bernard again in the seventh, bunting three hits for two runs, and Alan Stewart coming in to relieve Joe, did a good job striking out two and getting one of the three men who faced him.

Banks, Philadelphia southpaw, was very effective throughout the game allowing only four hits. Syd Bernard getting two and Outway and Carson each one. Banks had an eccentric wind-up with men on the sacks, and his antics caused considerable amusement among the spectators.

The All-Stars went into the lead for the first time during the day in the second inning. Ankrum, Harmon Field backstop, played well, stole second and was the first to first, went to second on a wild pitch, took third when Banks, Philly flinger threw wild to the keyhole sack to catch the big fellow, and then stole home. The thunderous applause from the fans.

The daring steal cost the locals Ankrum's services behind the plate, however, because he resisted his knee in sliding home, and went out of the game while catching in the next inning.

Two U. S. Stars Eliminated By Toronto Golf Aces

RIVERSIDE GOLF CLUB, N. B., Aug. 25.—(CP)—Two Toronto golfers supplied the fireworks today in the Canadian ladies' open golf championship by eliminating two top-ranking American stars, but the invader-champion continued serenely on her way.

Miss Ada Mackenzie and Mrs. J. B. Sawright took it upon themselves to have the American forces while the whole field was whittled down to eight for tomorrow's 18-hole quarter-final.

The defending champion, 21-year-old Grace Lennox, of Newington, Conn., finished early with a 4-and-3 victory over Mrs. T. M. Lockwood of Montreal before the Toronto pair put on their rousing display.

Robinson, tournament veteran and five times title-holder, overcame Miss Pat O'Sullivan of Orange, Conn., 2-and-1 in a tight battle.

Sawright had an even closer call before eliminating Mrs. Catherine Fox Park of Belleville, N. J., on the 18th green.

Miss Mackenzie won three holes on the first nine and lost two. On the home trip, calling on her experience against Miss O'Sullivan's power hitting, she won the 10th and 14th. The American girl refused to quit winning the 15th. The 17th was halved and the match was over.

Mrs. Sawright staged a thrilling finish to oust Mrs. Park. Starting the home nine one up, Mrs. Sawright faltered and not only saw the third lead wiped out but soon faced a two-hole deficit. She quickly pulled herself together and, with Mrs. Park starting to weaken, won the last three holes. To take the all-important 18th she calmly sank a 10-foot putt for a par three.

The draw for tomorrow sees Miss Mackenzie against Mrs. Sawright.

Toronto's third golfer still in the championship chase is Mrs. Cecil Gooderham, Ontario champion, who defeated Miss Josephine Jarvis of Victoria 4 and 2.
