Y. M. C. A. WORK.

As Canada's army overseas increases, the Military Service Department of the Y. M. C. A., keeps pace in additions to its ranks of workers among our soldiers in England and in France. Ten more men have just sailed and two more will leave shortly, making in all 82 special officers appointed to look after the comforts and religious welfare of our men, not only in camp and in hospital, but in dugouts in shellied areas, just behind the firing line. Already two have given up their lives, one shot and killed, another the victim of overwork and exposure.

Among the last group of overseas secretaries are two men well known in the Maritime provinces: Capt. C. G. Mackenzie, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and Capt. J. G. McKay of Little Branch, New Brunswick. Capt. Mackenzie is a graduate of Acadia College and was appointed Student Secretary at Dalhousie and travelled considerably in the Maritime Provinces in connection with these duties. During the past summer he was the chief of staff at Aldershot Camp.

Capt. McKay is also a graduate of Acadia College and was appointed House Master at Acadia Academy. For several years he served as assistant pastor in Napan and Harwick sections of St. Stephens congregation. During the summer of 1916 he was the Y. M. C. A. staff at Aldershot and did service also at Fredericton.

JAMES McNAMARA CONFESSED DYNAMITER, REFUSES TO WORK IN MILL.

San Quentin, Cal., Jan. 23.—After seventeen days spent in the dungeon of the state prison here, James McNamara, who is serving a life time sentence for his confessed part in the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building in 1910, continued steadfast today in his refusal to work in the jute mill. Every day he is brought out and asked if he is ready to work in the mill. As regularly he refuses and then is led back to the dungeon. He has been confined there longer than any other prisoner in the last five years.

QUICK RESPONSE SOON END WAR

The following letter has been received by Mrs. Melvin Wood, Farmington, from her son, Howard Guy, Dec. 31st, 1916:

Dear mother: Just a few lines to let you know I am well, and getting along fine. I got the cake you sent me alright, also the one Aunt Beattie sent me. I gave all the boys from around home some. They said it was the best they tasted since they left home. I am getting lots to eat, and I weigh one hundred and twenty-two pounds. I don't have to work very hard.

We fall in line at 7.45 in the morning. We practice bayonet fighting for two and a half hours and we learn trench digging in the afternoon. I don't know when we will go to France. We hear from the boys that are in the trenches. We would all like to go over now and help out. By the time we get there, the winter will be over. Our captain is a fine man. I think you know him, his name is Alwick Dawson. Our lieutenant is Mr. McLean, from Georgetown. We all think a lot of our officers. So Karl enlisted. If all the young men would be up and doing, the enemy would soon be brought to their knees. Well, Mamma, I would like to be home today and go to Grandpa's to catch some trout, by the old mill wheel, and have a chat with the pretty lassie on the hill, but some day I'll wander back again to hearts, so fond and true.

Now, dear mother, I will bring my letter to a close with lots of love and kisses.
