

Maritime Bowling Tourney To Open Next Week On New Sporting Club Alleys

The Maritime bowling championships, including the State of Maine, will get underway in Charlottetown next week, when teams from Moncton, Halifax, Woodstock, Sydney, Glace Bay, Truro, New Glasgow, St. John, Dartmouth, Charlottetown, and other points through the Maritime Province as well as a team from Foulton, Maine, will compete here in a full week of bowling competitions.

The tournament which will begin Monday morning, November 1st, will also mark the official opening of six of the finest up-to-date bowling alleys to be seen in Eastern Canada, which have just been installed by Mr. Joey MacDonald, manager of the Charlottetown Sporting Club, where the Maritime bowling meet will be held.

The new alleys, which were completed last week-end by the Brunswick-Balke Colender Company Limited of Canada, with headquarters at Toronto and Montreal, have everything in the way of modern bowling equipment and conveniences. Besides having six beautiful hardwood alleys, the interior of the building itself is finished off in an attractive color scheme of dark brown, light tan and white, with the alleys brilliantly lighted with three strings of six 150 watt lighting fixtures. Something new in the way of equipment which Mr. MacDonald has added to his new installation, are special combination flood-light and foul signal fixtures, which are centrally suspended over the pins of each alley. The fixtures provide a dual performance, in which they supply flood-lighting directly over the pins, while at the same time a green light flashes on every time a bowler makes a foul, informing him of his error. The foul light is operated from a central panel board which will be under the control of an appointed referee during competitive matches, who on seeing a competitor committing a foul, flicks on the light over the corresponding alley.

Other conveniences included in the new set-up are safety ball return devices and the latest in movable scoring stands, which Mr. MacDonald has installed for the benefit of the bowling public at his new "bowling emporium."

With the assistance of an outstanding coach plus a former player from N.H.L. circles, P.E.I. hockey mediators will have the opportunity of receiving first class instruction on coaching and refereeing at a hockey school for coaches and referees to be run in Charlottetown early in December.

The glad tidings were received over the week-end from Brigadier W. W. Reid, director of physical fitness for the Province, who had conferred with the N.H.L.'s Hockey League president, Clarence Campbell, on his return trip to this Province from a recent visit to Ottawa.

Although the names of these instructors have not yet been released, Brigadier Reid said that he had received the promised full cooperation in supplying two competent instructors for such a school, which in all probability will start on a Friday and continue on until Monday.

The Department of Physical Fitness deserves much credit for promoting this new scheme, which will give our local hockey officials a chance to benefit by first hand expert advice on the ins and outs of hockey, which will in turn be of invaluable service to hockey clubs throughout the Province as a whole.

It is hoped by the Department that every prospective coach and referee from all the outlying districts in the Province will take full advantage of this opportunity and be in attendance at the school sessions.

A special meeting of the executive of the Charlottetown Tennis Club will be held tonight to propose an amendment to the constitution changing the holding of the annual meeting from the spring to the fall, and if the amendment goes through, the regular routine of the annual meeting will be carried out and the officers for the coming year will be elected.

The reason for the change is due to the fact that the present executive feel that a new slate of officers elected in the fall just after the tennis season closes, would be in a better position to become properly organized, financially and otherwise with the full winter and spring months ahead. During the winter months the executive are of the opinion that means of raising funds could be carried out more easily and by the late spring improvements to the courts would get underway without any unnecessary delay.

It was reported last night by the Department of Physical Fitness, that 11 new entries, 10 from Summerside and one from Georgetown, have been received for the P. E. I. amateur boxing championship which will be held at the Armouries this Friday, thus boosting the number of entries to date.

Prominent Baseball Executive Dies At 57

CHICAGO, Oct. 25 (AP)—Harry Grabner, who rose from peanut vendor to vice-president of the Chicago White Sox, died in a coma yesterday, 48 hours after undergoing an operation for brain tumor.

Grabner was with the Comiskey Club 41 years before resigning in 1945. In 1946 he became associated with the League executive.

Although only 57, Grabner was the third only to Connie Mack of Philadelphia Athletics and Clark Griffith of Washington Senators in years of American League service.

His first introduction to the Comiskey family came on a Sunday morning in 1904. He was passing by the old White Sox park and noticed a man sprinkling sawdust over wet spots on the field. Young Harry approached and volunteered to help. The lone groundskeeper, Charles A. Comiskey, founder of the Sox, then from on the youngster was with the Sox.

Detroit And Chicago Announce Player Trade

DETROIT, Oct. 25 (AP)—A three-for-two player trade with the Chicago Black Hawks was announced today by the Detroit Red Wings of the National Hockey League.

Detroit is giving up left wings Jim (Pencil) Conacher and Armand (Bep) Guldin in return for right wing Norman (Bud) Folle and centre George Gee.

Polle, 24, from Fort William, Ont., was on the League's second all-star team last year and was fifth in scoring with 25 goals and 29 assists.

Chicago obtained him from Toronto during last season. A Detroit spokesman said acquisition of Gee, who is from Stratford, Ont., would enable the Wings to shift Pete Foreck back from centre to his regular left-wing post.

With the addition of the two, the spokesman said, the League-leading Wings will have needed reinforcements for the right side of the ice.

Conacher, 27, who has been with Detroit since the middle of the 1946 season, probably will be missed most by Detroit fans. His fast and fancy skating has been a crowd pleaser.

The Wings obtained Guldin, 23, from Boston in a swap for Billy Taylor, who later was traded to New York with a gambling investigation. Both Conacher and Guldin moved into the N. H. L. after playing with the Oshawa, Ont., Generals.

McCaig, 28, and from Guelph, Ont., never has played a complete season for Detroit. Some years he has shuttled between the Wings and their farm clubs and he missed the last half of last season with a fractured ankle.

The swap is expected to be completed within 24 hours, the Wings' spokesman said.
