Hear Complaints Game Laws Broken

Complaints have reached Royal Canadian Mounted Police that gunners and trappers in certain sections of the province are not complying with the game laws and are persisting in hunting and trapping after the period allowed by law has elapsed. The season on rabbits and foxes closed on February 15th and trappers who have taken up their traps are determined that others do the same.

It is also understood that Mounted Police are investigating complaints that poisoned bait was used on foxes by would-be trappers in certain specified districts during the past winter, and that analysis of bait taken up by Police reacted to the strychnine test. This offence is punishable under the Criminal Code of Canada and anyone who places out poison bait is not only wasting money but is also liable to a fine of \$500.00, over and above damage caused, or a year in prison.

The practice of placing out poisoned bait is not only wasting money but is also highly dangerous to domestic animals such as dogs, live stock, etc., liable to a fine of \$500.00, over and above damage caused, or a year in prison.

On the whole hunters and trappers adhere strictly to the game laws, but there is always the individual who is never satisfied, no difference how long the open season may be.

C. C. F. Backs Gov't Policy For Aviation

OTTAWA, March 20 (CP)—Copies of the C.C.F. Party program today put their party behind the government's policy on civil aviation in both the domestic and international fields.

Owing to a misunderstanding as to what subjects were to be taken up today the debate on munitions minister Howe's statement on the subject of aviation was adjourned until later.

But the party leader of that party, said he had understood munitions department estimates were to be discussed.

The C.C.F. had only one criticism of the air policy which calls for separation of airways from railway ownership, creation of an air transport board to regulate domestic traffic and an international air transport authority for international traffic. Spokesmen said it did not go far enough.

The C.C.F. (Winnipeg North Centre) said he thought the government should have moved for international operation of international airlines as well as for international regulation. In the domestic field he said he thought the government should move at once to nationalize three strategic air routes and make them part of trans-Canada Air Lines, the northwest staging route from Edmonton to Alaska, the Mackenzie River route and the Labrador route.

Justice Minister St. Laurent introduced a bill to authorize an enlargement of the Exchequer Court of Canada from two judges to three and Angus MacInnis (O.C.F.-Vancouver East) obtained first reading for an amendment to the Criminal Code aimed at curbing activities which set races and groups one against another.

Heavy Air Blows Against Nazis Continue

LONDON, March 20 (AP)—Fighter-scarred United States heavy bombers, thundering through pea soup clouds, bombed military targets in the Frankfurt area today in the major operation of a day which saw between 1,600 and 2,100 British-based Allied planes of all types in the air against the Germans.

Six American bombers and eight fighters failed to return, the bulletin said, while the escorting fighters brought down four of the German planes of the few encountered in the dense clouds.

The Frankfurt radio network broadcast warnings tonight that Allied aircraft were crossing southern Belgium toward Frankfurt, indicating that R. A. F. bombers were bound for the Reich.
