DOMINION HAS AUTHORITY SAYS PREMIER

Prime Minister Makes Statement On Labor Legislation.

Ottawa, Feb. 8.—The Dominion has power to control hours of labor and enact the eight-hour day, Premier R. B. Bennett told the House of Commons today. His legal argument as a basis for the constitutional power of the government, in the opinion of some persons, would transgress the Dominion's powers under the British North America Act.

Parliament was asked to approve four Labor conventions negotiated at the International Labor Congress at Geneva. One of them dealt with the eight-hour day and the 48-hour week.

Basis of the Prime Minister's argument was that the Dominion had exclusive power to deal with obligations established by treaty. A ratified Geneva convention became part of the original Treaty of Versailles and, therefore, its terms and obligations were within the competence of Parliament.

Hon. Ernest Lapointe, former Minister of Justice, disputed the Prime Minister's opinion, claiming legislation over hours of labor rested with the provinces.

Civil Servants Ask Salary Of \$100 Per Month

Ottawa, Feb. 8.—The Amalgamated Civil Servants of Canada today asked Finance Minister E. N. Rhodes that a minimum salary of \$100 a month be set for all full-time government service positions held by men, re-establishment of the system of promotions and salary increases and reform of superannuation regulations.

When the estimates were introduced into the House of Commons by the Finance Minister some days ago Mr. Rhodes announced restoration of one-half of the ten percent salary deduction. This would have effect from the end of the current fiscal year.

The delegates led by President Harold Baker of Vancouver Secretary Fred Knowles of Ottawa, claimed 3,779 male servants were being paid less than \$1,200 a year in 1929 and that the number had been increased considerably since then by the general ten percent salary cut imposed as an economy measure.

They said that during the last three years civil servants had contributed through pay cuts a total of \$23,400,000 to the national treasury and pointed to increased government revenue as a reason for restoring former salaries.

They asked full political rights for civil servants, including privileges of running for political offices.

The delegates declared resolutions before the Royal Commission on price spreads and mass buying had shown "the condition of the bottom dog in Canada is deplorable." They said "had the principles embodied in the labor part of the Versailles peace treaties (which Canada signed) been lived up to, there would be no necessity of price spreads committees or representations on behalf of a minimum wage principles 15 years after the treaties were signed."

The delegation sought optional retirement on completion of 35 years' service or at the age of 60.

Bright Spots Of The Week

VANCOUVER — Western Bridge Company will start soon on construction of a \$360,000 steel plant here.

PORT HOVE, Ont.—A tack and nail plant will be established here by Manuel Cabral who has leased part of Perfect Machine Company's plant.

SARNIA, Ont.—Options have been taken on farms near Courtwright by Side Kenya Gas Company of Bombay, India, with view to development of calcium chloride from deep wells in that vicinity.

GLACE BAY, N. S. — Dominion Coal Company collieries raised 264,000 tons of coal in January, highest monthly total output since 1927.

WINDSOR, Ont. — Survey of 68 companies in Border Cities shows 13,466 employs on payrolls at first of year, an increase of 916. Dominion Foundries and Steel Company will build \$15,000 addition to their plant.

HAMILTON — Since January 1, more than 50 families have become self-supporting through increase of employment, thus easing the relief burden.

TILSONBURG, Ont. — Scott-McHale Shoe Company of London will take over and operate the Tilsonburg Shoe Plant that has been idle for months.
