CRYING DOWN PROHIBITION.

We printed yesterday an account of three men arrested in Moncton for being drunk and plying there, who gave a disparaging account of the operations of the Prohibitory Law in Charlottetown. Those who know the men in question will not think much the less of Prohibition on account of their story. The cold facts are that the three men, Mahar, McKinnon and Smith are very much wanted in this city at the present time and found it convenient to get out of the way.

They are wanted to give testimony in the prohibition cases against Essoy and Hughes, now pending and which cases stand adjourned to await the reluctant appearance of the three men who were crying down prohibition in the Moncton police court. The Moncton papers say they were "run in" there for being drunk and noisy. Under such circumstances their noise can do no great harm to prohibition.

Their sudden exit from Charlottetown and their appearance in Moncton, when rightly understood, affords convincing evidence of the vigor with which the law is being enforced. As to their story that they took from Charlottetown the whiskey on which they got drunk in Moncton, few will believe that the "bottle" would have lasted so long and so far. The strong chances are that their supply must have been replenished after reaching the mainland.

When released from durance in Moncton let them come back and tell their story here and name the places where it is so easy to get whiskey in Charlottetown. It is not perhaps too much to ask of those journals which may have published the disparaging report of this precious trio against prohibition in Charlottetown, to give the other facts here related, which are necessary to a right appreciation of the value of their testimony.

PROSECUTOR LESLIE HEARD FROM.

SIR:—In reply to More Anon, if he had temperance at heart and a man of principle, he might at least spend two cents for a stamp and inform me of any violators of the law. EDITOR'S MAIL.

THE SMELT INDUSTRY.

SIR:—Many smelt shippers who have tried this year to take advantage of the high prices offered in Boston for green smelts put on the market during the month of November and early December have met with failure and all agree that the cause lies with the Canadian Express Company. And as the matter is of some importance to both the fishermen and the Express Co. it is to be hoped that some better arrangement can be made than the one now in force. Briefly the cause of the failure is this: The Canadian Express Co. having rights on the I. G. R. carry those fish directed to Boston over the I. G. R. to Montreal and thence forward to Boston, which means a delay of some 10 hours, or just enough to prohibit the fish going on the market the day after leaving Charlottetown. The fish are consequently one day longer before being marketed and are during this extra time in the warmest part of the journey.

The practical route is the one taken by passengers via St. John, but this of course would mean that the Canadian Express Co. would have to turn the packages over to the Dominion Express Co. at Palms Junction, and consequently less profit to the Canadian Express Co.

Every shipper will allow that Mr. Henderson, the Charlottetown Agent of the Canadian Express Co. is most painstaking regarding these perishable shipments, but feel that when they have to pay the high rate of over 2 cents per pound that they should get the quickest transportation and be entitled to have the fish kept in a cool place and not near the steam pipes in the express car.

Trusting that some arrangement can be made to overcome this inconvenience, I remain, R.C.M.
