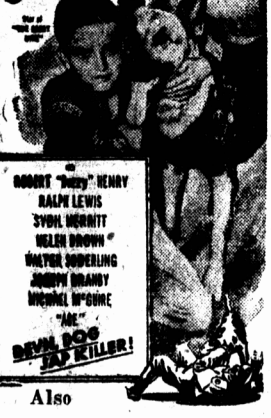

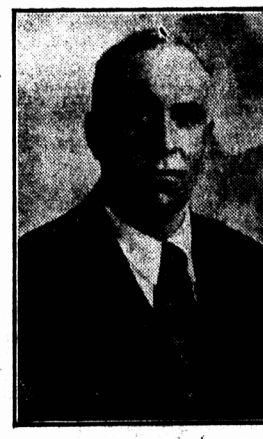

HON. J. A. CAMPBELL IN REMINISCENT MOOD

In a reminiscent mood in the Legislature Tuesday night, Hon. J. A. Campbell, Fourth District of King's, recalled some interesting recollections of his early days by way of comment on the current situation.

Decision Given In Maternity Home Case

HALIFAX, March 28 — (CP) — Two convictions and one dismissal on charges of violating the Maternity Boarding House Act were registered in the case of the Ideal Maternity Home and Sanatorium, Limited, in Halifax County Court today.

The Home was convicted of conducting a maternity boarding house without a licence under the act and of keeping mothers with infants for board without a licence. A charge of advertising that it would arrange for adoption of a child under the age of three years without written consent of the Provincial Director of Child Welfare was dismissed.

Two other charges against William P. Young, vice-president and manager of the home, and a charge against Lila Young, his wife, were set over until next Wednesday for hearing the Medical Act.

Young and his wife were charged with practicing medicine in Nova Scotia while not listed on the medical register. Young was also charged with using the title "doctor" while not being registered under the Medical Act.

A seventh charge, against the home, of boarding a child under the age of 12 without the written consent of the Superintendent of Neglected and Delinquent Children was dropped by the Crown.

Fred Rose Has Bail Withdrawn

MONTREAL, March 28 — (CP) — Criminal court phase of the espionage case against Fred Rose member for Montreal-Carleton, and member of Parliament, committed for trial and detained in jail upon withdrawal of \$10,000 bail.

Judge Rene Thibierge, who presided over the four-day preliminary hearing of the Labor-Progressive member for Montreal-Carleton, ordered Rose to trial when he appeared briefly for voluntary statement this morning.

The 38-year-old native of Lublin, Poland, is in the Montreal jail, pending outcome of application for bail his defence counsel will make in court of King's bench tomorrow. If it is refused, application will be made in superior court.

Commitment for trial came as no surprise and while cancellation of bail was a startling development to the public, Justice Thibierge made clear that legal procedure gave him no alternative in this case.

Sun Spots Cause Widespread Trouble

TORONTO, March 28 — (CP) — Sun spots played hob with communication systems throughout Canada today in that some experts said were the worst such disturbances in the experience of electrical scientists.

Wire traffic of news services, telephone, telegram and wireless companies was hit hard as the ubiquitous electrons from the spots entered the earth's atmosphere to set up electro-magnetic disturbances that jumbled letters in transmission and prevented long-distance telephone communications in some sections. Some radio circuits were jammed with static.

The spots began "striking" overnight and by dawn had caused temporary paralysis.

Leased wires of The Canadian Press, National news service, suffered heavily. The Toronto main office reported all but complete paralysis at opening of its wires to Eastern and Western Canada.

Later, the situation eased to permit transmission to main points such as Winnipeg and Montreal, Vancouver and Halifax.

In U.S. Too NEW YORK, March 28 — (CP) — Aurora borealis, which has been troubling communications facilities periodically for three weeks, struck with renewed force early today, causing one of the most severe interruptions since it began acting up.

LONDON — (CP) — The porters at Spitalfields (Stepney) Market cheered when the first shipment of bananas they had handled in six years arrived recently.
