**TRINITY UNITED CHURCH**

At the morning service the minister spoke on "True Religion" and defined religion in the words of Augustine, meaning "to bind" and suggested that true religion must contain at least these three fundamental elements: it must bind the human soul to God, humanify the personality and bind together hu-

man beings in a great fellowship. Religion, in binding the human spirit to God, indicates that it is possible for the human spirit to have a real participation in the Divine nature. Jesus never used the word "religion" but the word "rite"—"I and the Father are One" and religion in that sense gives to life adventure and a sense of loyalty, making us recognize that we are not simply the creators of what is happening today but are souls which are bound to God. It is not merely an individual experience but is part of nature, tribal life, birth, marriage and death, and to be true must always be simple as it was interpreted by Jesus, so that it may be understood by the least as well as the greatest. In this regard we quote from Micah who said: "What doth the Lord require of thee but to do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with thy God." Religion has three dimensions: God, self and our fellowmen.

In the evening the minister spoke on "Christian Character" and emphasized the great necessity today of training character in the religious, moral and ethical principles of the Christian faith. He suggested that in the world, in a very acute form, we have a keen struggle between Christians and anti-Christians and that though the latter may have great power, only those trained in the spirit and mind of Christ can possibly bring beauty, goodness and justice to the world.

Mr. Roy Smallman was the soloist at the evening service and, as usual, sang most pleasingly. The Junior, Primary and Beginners Departments of the Sunday School met at the usual hour.

**HOME ECONOMICS TAUGHT IN BIG GEORGIAN HOUSE**

(Canadian Press Staff Writer) WINNIPEG, July 24 — (CP) — It's not hard to enjoy housework when it's done in an exquisitely furnished 17,000 Georgian home, as up to date as a shiny new nickel.

Every co-ed studying Home Economics at the University of Manitoba lives in this home-maker's dream for a month of her four-year course and to the majority, it's the most thrilling part of their studies. The University Home Management House is a dignified red brick structure, with a neat white wood trim. It is built on the strictly symmetrical lines of the late 17th and early 18th centuries and is situated on the scenic grounds of the University in suburban Fort Garry.

The 11 rooms and three baths, all furnished with a practical but stylish eye, take a lot of looking after, but there's no shortage of household help.

Each month 10 girls in third year Home Economics move into the house—and for that month it's home. They take turns as cook, laundress, child director, maid, dishwasher, and manager, but still find time to attend regular classes and study two hours daily.

One of the most important features is the baby. Each year the house gets a baby from a children's society and at the end of the term it is adopted by a family. During its year in the home the infant is cared for by 70 beautiful co-eds, who lavish more attention on it than they do on the current heart-throb.
