LONDON, Oct. 12.—(Special) — Lord Kitchener telegraphs today that General French's column captured commandant Schaefer.

HOME FROM BRITAIN AND THE CONTINENT

Mr. Paton Speaks of His Visit to the Capital of Italy and Describes the London Post Office

Florence is the Athens of Italy, the home of Michael Angelo, Dante and Savonarola. In this city, if we were artists, years could be spent in the study of the beautiful paintings that hang in the galleries or in the halls of the sculptures. We visited the Pitti and Uffizi Palaces, the Grottoes, Campanile, Battistero. There are two magnificent brass gates on the Battistero. The one facing the Cathedral Michael Angelo is believed to have said was worthy of being the Gate of Paradise. The designs on this beautiful piece of work represent the creation of man; the sentence of God on our first parents and their expulsion from paradise; Noah after the deluge; the promise made to Abraham and the sacrifice on the Mount, Esau ceding his birthright, Joseph and his brothers, the Law given from Mount Sinai, the Walls of Jericho, the Battle with the Ammonites, the Queen of Sheba in Solomon's palace.

We had a very enjoyable drive. I noticed in this city as well as the others I have seen that great care is taken with the trees planted on the streets and avenues, and even along the country roads, the greatest of care is taken in keeping the trees in good shape.

The view from Piazzale Michelangelo is exceedingly fine, it is not only Florence we get a good view of, but also of the surrounding villages. On our way up to the top of this hill there are beautiful gardens and long avenues well sheltered with trees. Right on the top of the hill there are several very fine statues—Day and Night, Twilight and Dawn are really splendid.

We went from Florence to Rome. I would like to have stayed in this city for a month. Every day we were there was full of interest; two days we spent with Dr. Forbes the highly accomplished archaeologist, are days that will linger long on our memory. During our stay in this city we visited the Catacombs, Palatine Hill, City of Romulus and the Palace of the Caesars, St. Peter's Church, the Vatican; Museum of Sculpture and Galleries of Paintings the Sistine Chapel, Scala Sancta, Baths of Caracalla, the Forum Romanum, Arch of Constantine; and other places of great interest. In St. John's Lateran Church we saw the Pope's new chair; it is extremely handsome, and is made of a great many different kinds of marble with lots of mosaic work on it. In the same church is the place where the Pope has selected to be buried in. The ceiling of the Sistine Chapel is a great work of art; it was painted by Michel Angelo. Along the centre of the ceiling the creation of the world is represented, and at the end facing us as we enter the chapel, there is a painting (The Judgement day) with three hundred Roman figures on it. The pictures and sculptures in the Vatican Galleries are a magnificent collection.

On the floor of the Vatican there is one very ancient piece of mosaic pavement said to be the finest in the world. The colors of marble are certainly very beautiful.

There is also a marble bowl here which is a wonderful piece of work. It is made out of one piece of marble and rests on four lions. The bowl measures twenty seven feet in circumference. Words of mine cannot convey the beautiful interior of St. Peter's Cathedral but let me give you this advice, when you go to Rome, go to St. Peter's. When you enter and walk about half way from the door to the dome, look up to the ceiling towards the dome and keep looking till you get below the dome; by doing this, you will look upon one of the finest things in Rome. It looks as if an immense curtain was being drawn aside and the beautiful paintings come in sight.

The City of Rome seems to be well looked after; the streets are clean and kept free from dust by using lots of water. Tourists are besieged with peddlars on the streets selling all kinds of trinkets.

We had a very pleasant journey from Rome to Pisa. The train runs for many miles along the Mediterranean Sea. In Pisa we saw the wonderful Leaning Tower. As the day was very hot we did not climb to the top, but contented ourselves by taking a walk round the base. In the Baptistery there is a wonderful echo produced; when anyone sings, the echo rolls back like the sound of a large pipe organ. From Pisa we went to Turin and from Turin to Paris where we spent seven days taking in the principal sights of that beautiful and gay city. We also spent a day at Versailles. To give you a detailed account of our stay in Paris would require a special edition of your paper.

We had a beautiful day to cross the English Channel and arrived in London in time for tea. We spent three weeks in this the largest city in the world. During our stay here I think we saw almost everything that is of any importance. A friend kindly gave us tickets to admit us through the General Post Office. We also got through the Government Telegraph Office. In this department there are three thousand four hundred employees. Twelve hundred of this number are young ladies to hear the tick, tick of many hundred message receivers. It is wonderful that the operator is able to take the message correctly. The Post Office is like a bee hive, and hundreds of post men
