The launch is comfortably arranged and will carry about 25 passengers. This is a much needed improvement over the sail boat service which has been in vogue since the removal of the tug, Frank C. Butt last spring, and the travelling public may now count upon a prompt service.

With such an increasing demand for bathing accommodations and with clean and enticing beaches such as we have right at our doors a little enterprise on the part of some of our citizens is all that is needed to make Summerside a popular place for strangers seeking these.
