### DESTROYING YOUNG OYSTERS

"A Citizen" writes that while shooting along Johnson's River one day last week he found heaps of small oysters scattered along the shore. On inquiry he learned that these were left there by oyster fishermen who make a practice of landing their catch, big and small and when culling them those that are not large enough for shipping are left to bleach and spoil. This is a most reckless and destructive method, and must inevitably cause the destruction of the beds. Had our oyster fishery been managed with reasonable care and judgment in past years it would today be a mine of untold wealth. As our correspondent points out, it is the duty of the wardens to see that such destructive practices as those complained of shall not be permitted to continue. It is clear that if the young and unmerchantable oysters are destroyed there will soon be none that are merchantable.

### PROHIBITION MOVING ON.

In widely separated countries Prohibition is making headway. In New Zealand, the Australian Commonwealth, in the United States and Canada and now in Finland the Prohibition cause is moving on. Finland has a Parliament of its own and comes nearer to be a self governing community than any other province of Russia. Some years ago it adopted woman suffrage, and there are nineteen women sitting in its Parliament. That body has now adopted a Prohibitory Law, not only delegating the sale, but also the manufacture and importation of liquors. This is advanced ground. It remains to be seen whether the Czar, who possesses the veto power, will sanction Finland's Prohibitory Law. But whether he will do so or not, the fact remains that the people of Finland have demanded, and their Parliament has enacted a stringent Prohibitory Law.

Tunnel meetings are announced to be held at Sackville and Monoton on Thursday and Friday, the 7th and 8th instant.

There was considerable interest among politicians in this City over the election in Bellechasse. A number of inquiries were made by The Guardian personally and by telephone on the evening following the contest. A number of inquirers thought it would be a close fight, while a few believed Bourassa's chances to be good. The results show that as Sir John Macdonald used to say, an election and a horse race are always uncertain.

### BOURASSA'S DEFEAT.

Mr. Bourassa's defeat in Bellechasse was a crushing one. He was snowed under by a majority of 788 recorded in favor of the man he had accused. Hon. Mr. Turgeon is now reinstated in the Legislature from which he resigned, and Mr. Bourassa is down and out. He gave up a seat in the Commons to try conclusions with Mr. Turgeon for a seat in the Legislature and now he has no foothold in either the local or the federal Chamber. In the eyes of the scoffing multitude he is the man who looked for trouble and found it.

And this is not quite all. Mr. Bourassa has suffered somewhat in both reputation and prestige. The litigant should come into court with clean hands. Mr. Bourassa has been pined before the public as one who pocketed federal money to which he was not fairly entitled as "expenses" in connection with the Alaska Boundary Commission of which he was secretary. Whether this is true or not, it is more or less damaging, and will remain so until explained, or cleared up in some way. It is the more damaging because of the exceptionally upright reputation he enjoyed before the late campaign.

In prestige he has suffered even more. He has fine talents, a good presence, and claimed direct descent from a great Canadian leader of sixty years ago. He had gained a position of some prominence in Parliament where his speeches were listened to with interest, and in the country at large he was looked upon as a man of great possibilities. In his constituency of LaBelle he was so popular as to be invincible. His admirers had come to think he might one day be a rival of Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself for the leadership of Quebec. His present defeat is for the time at least, a crushing blow to his prestige and his ambition.

It remains to be seen what effect his defeat will have upon Mr. Bourassa himself. Will he abandon public life? Will he seek re-election to the House of Commons in LaBelle? And if he does so, will he be elected? His opponents, now flushed

with victory, might carry the war into his own stronghold. We shall not have long to wait for the answer, for the election in LaBelle will soon be held and Mr. Bourassa must decide quickly. It would be regrettable should he either retire from, or be excluded from the Commons. There are too few independent members. He has been useful and might be even more useful in the future by reason of the wholesome check his vanity has received.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has in the past shown Mr. Bourassa much consideration. He had until lately at least, a warm spot in his heart for the late member for LaBelle. Sir Wilfrid is not vindictive. It may therefore be that the way will be made easy for Mr. Bourassa's return to Parliament, possibly unopposed. Sir Wilfrid would lose nothing thereby and could well afford to pursue a magnanimous course. Mr. Bourassa has still many friends and admirers in Quebec but is now at Sir Wilfrid's mercy. It will be of interest to watch the developments of the next few days or weeks in that quarter.
