## Yankees' Winning Streak Halted By Detroit Tigers In 13 Inning Contest 5-4

### IN THIS CORNER

Despite the adverse weather local tennis enthusiasts are limbering-up for what looks as a banner season in the sport. With all six of the Charlottetown Club courts in A-1 condition exponents of the game are working out the "kinks" after a winter's layoff and interest is daily mounting.

With the Eastern Canadian championships to be staged here early in August, Club officials are leaving no stone unturned to have everything in ship-shape and assure the running of the tournament with a maximum amount of efficiency.

This is as it should be. All, however, should not be left to those actively engaged in promoting the game. The general public should rally behind those in charge and lend support to the undertaking. It will not only be a red-letter day in tennis circles, but an honor which, along with the Maritime golf meet, will bring this city and province prominently to the fore in sporting circles throughout the Dominion, providing inestimable publicity value.

If reports bear out Vivian McGrath and Jack Crawford together will hold the fate of the Australian Davis Cuppers in their battle with the United States tennis in the North American zone finals during the weekend. McGrath will in all probability be called on to substitute for the ailing Adrian Quist. Both will see action in the singles events and then team up in the all-crucial doubles event against Budge and Mabo upon which critics state will rest the outcome of the contest.

The weatherman frowned again yesterday and silence reigned on both baseball and softball fronts. The forced layoff, however, will only serve to heighten interest with both players and fans eager to look forward to a resumption of play. Two sport fixtures are scheduled this evening for the Victoria Park. The Anchors and Bees meet in their initial clash in the hard-ball circuit, while in softball the high-rising Rovers will show their wares against the unpredictable Superiors.

Maxie Baer partially redeemed his woe-filled comeback attempt on English soil last night by scoring a ninth round technical K.O. over Ben Foord of South Africa. His unimpressive display when stopped suddenly by Tommy Farr in his initial attempt to gain the fistic spotlight will, however, not be ascribed to the fact that he was further proof before considering Maxie a potent heavy contender.

A timely homer by Mel Ott yesterday saved the day for Hubbell and the Giants. King Carl rang up his 24th straight victory covering two seasons, while his team registered their sixth straight triumph. The tobacco chewing hurler, although he only saw service in two innings, proved the same cool calculating mound performer, pitching hitless, but apparently confident of the "break" which would end the deadlock.

While their city rivals continued in the win column the Yankees were stopped short in an even half-dozen wins by the pilotless Detroit Tigers, who wielded their bats as if every blow meant a new lease of life for their stricken manager and every putout a chance for his complete recovery.

Ring followers hereabouts who were disappointed because there was no report on the John Henry Lewis and Al Ettore fight allegedly scheduled for Wednesday night need not be. There wasn't any. The report which claimed that several Maritime milt artists would show their wares was erroneous and the whole card was a phantom affair.

Charlottetown ball leagues are not the only ones suffering scheduled reverses because of the inclemency of the weather. The newly organized Summerside Baseball League which was to have gotten underway tonight has postponed its opening game between the Pioneers and the Soviets until Tuesday.

NEW YORK, May 27—Detroit Tigers "did it for Mickey" today. Fighting inning for inning in the American League's longest game of the year, they topped the Yankees here 5-4 in 13 frames and put the victory down in the books for their injured Manager Mickey Cochrane.

Even a homer by Lou Gehrig with two mates on base in the first inning couldn't stop the Detroiters as they snapped the Yankees' winning streak at six straight.

Two fly balls that fell safely in left field were "breaks" that aided the Tigers in coming from behind to tie the score in the ninth with a two-run spurge and win in the 13th.

A fly off the bat of pinch-hitter Babe Herman in the ninth fell safely between Tom Henrich and Joe Dimaggio. The hit advanced a runner to third and was followed by a single by Billy Rogell and a double by Goose Goslin to tie the score.

The second of the "foolish flies" was George Tebbets' hoist that dropped between Henrich and Red Rolfe for a double. A long single by Pete Fox scored Tebbets with the winning run.

#### Tribe Sweeps Series

Rallying for five runs in the fifth, Cleveland Indians defeated the Athletics 8-7 in Philadelphia for a clean sweep of a three-game series.

Hal Trosky's triple cleared the bases of three runners and wound up the five-run rally in the fifth. Johnson of Philadelphia and Hale and Solters of Cleveland knocked homers.

## Eight Survive In Amateur Golf Tourney

SANDWICH, Eng., May 27—A Scot, an Irishman and three Englishmen face the challenge of three Americans tomorrow when two rounds of the British amateur golf championship will narrow the field to the two players who on Saturday will battle over 36-holes for the title Hector Thomson of Scotland laid down due to ill health.

Regarded by a majority of observers as top man in the tournament was Gordon Peters, Scottish Walker Cup star who played strongly through today's two rounds to avoid the fate of all other Walker Cup stars, none of whom survived.

Lionel Munn, Irish veteran playing some of the soundest golf of his career, and J. J. P. Pennik, English amateur champion who today removed a leading American challenger, John Levinson, Chicago, were also impressive.

The other English players were regarded as long shots. They are Charles Stowe and Count Alaric de Benden, relative of John De Forest, amateur champion in 1932.

Emerging as leading United States threat was Wilford Weirle, young Racine, Wis., chemist, who played two brilliant rounds in today's high wind to dispose of two British rivals, A. J. Evans, one up, and J. H. Neal, Royal Air Force champion, 3 and 2.

He was joined by Dick Chapman, Greenwich, Conn., and Robert Sweeney, New York and London, who scraped into the quarter-finals because they encountered opponents that could do little.

## Timely Homer By Mel Ott Boosts Hubbell's Record; Bees Upset Cardinals 8-7

NEW YORK, May 27—Carl Hubbell threw his all-time high winning streak on the fire today in a two-inning relief trick against the Cincinnati Reds but with the help of a ninth-inning homer by Mel Ott he kept it out of danger and booted it to 24 straight victories.

Coming into the game with the score tied two-all at the start of the eighth, "King Carl" pitched hitless ball, as his mates gave him air-light fielding support and New York Giants topped the Reds 3-2 in Cincinnati for their sixth straight conquest.

First man up in the ninth, Ott blasted his seventh homer of the year into the right field bleachers to break up the ball game and spoil a fine pitching effort by Lefty Lee Griem, Cincinnati scribe.

Not a man reached first base in the two innings "squarepants" worked to achieve his eighth victory of the year, which, piled on his 16 straight of 1936, has given him the longest run in baseball history against league competition since he passed the 21-game mark May 13.

#### Phillies Drub Cubs

Philadelphia produced a 14-hit attack for an 11-2 win over the Cubs in Chicago and took the series two games to one.

Three Bruin pitchers were victims of the Philly offense as Bucky Walters coasted to his fourth victory of the campaign.

#### Bees Defeat Cards

Boston Bees shaded the Cardinals 8-7, in St. Louis as they continued, toward the top of the lower division.

Two of the Cards' 11 hits were homers, but Boston connected for 12 hits, including two homers, for an even break in the two-game series.

Last homer of the game was Don Padgett's circuit blow in the ninth with one on base but the Cards fell one short of tying the score.

## Little Hope Quist Will See Action

NEW YORK, May 27—Adrian Karl Quist, originally slated for the no. one singles role on Australia's Davis Cup tennis team, was so completely exhausted late today after a brief workout, his first in six days, there remained little doubt he is lost for the entire North American zone finals against the United States, starting this Saturday at Forest Hills.

Cliff Sproule, the Australian captain, gloomily conceded Quist's illness, diagnosed as intestinal "flu", was such as to warrant scant hope he would see any action whatever against the Americans, led by Don Budge of California.

Sproule insisted nevertheless on waiting for a further medical report tomorrow morning before deciding definitely to name Vivian McGrath as the replacement for Quist, in the singles, as well as for the doubles with the veteran Jack Crawford.

Unless there is an overnight change in prospects, the official draw at noon tomorrow will decide the singles pairings, with the names of Crawford, now the no. one Australian singles man, and McGrath to be put in the hat with those of Budge and Bryan (Betsy) Grant, diminutive Atlantian and no. three ranking United States player. ## Baer Scores Decisive Win Over Foord

LONDON, May 27—(AP)—Max Baer, the clowning California heavyweight, began his English "comeback" tonight with a technical knockout victory over Ben Foord, former British Empire champion from South Africa.

The referee stopped the one-sided bout in the ninth round after the ex-world heavyweight titleholder had given his opponent a severe beating.

Displaying the punch he sadly lacked when beaten by Tommy Farr in his English debut last month, Baer floored the South African twice in the second round and had him groggy the rest of the way. Baer outweighed his opponent 212 to 208 pounds.

The scheduled 12th round was a wild swinging affair from the start. The crowd of 8,000 roared when one of Baer's round-house lefts tagged Referee Jack Hart instead of Foord. The official was not hurt.

Confusion reigned when the fight ended with Foord on the floor, face downward, and bleeding. The South African's seconds threw in a towel but the referee, who was counting over the fallen warrior, refused to recognize it.

Foord rose to his knees but slumped backward as Hart stopped his counting and awarded the fight to Baer. He disallowed the verdict of the timekeeper, who counted Foord out.

## Hope Grows For Recovery Of Cochrane

NEW YORK, May 27—(AP)—As hundreds of friends and fans cheered him with telegrams, letters and flowers, Mickey Cochrane showed marked improvement today.

The Detroit Baseball Manager, struck in the temple Tuesday by a ball pitched by Irving (Bump) Hadley of New York Yankees, still was in serious condition with his physicians on guard against the grave danger of secondary meningitis but confidence of his ultimate recovery grew with the passing hours.

Only one bulletin was issued by his attending physicians today. Signed by Robert Emmet Walsh, it read: Cochrane has passed a good night. His condition was improved. Informally, Dr. Walsh later said the patient had received numerous ice packs during the day and night and was resting comfortably.

Probably the surest sign of improvement was Mrs. Cochrane herself. After keeping a constant vigil from a room across the hall of her husband's sick bed in St. Elizabeth's Hospital, she decided to move to a midtown hotel.

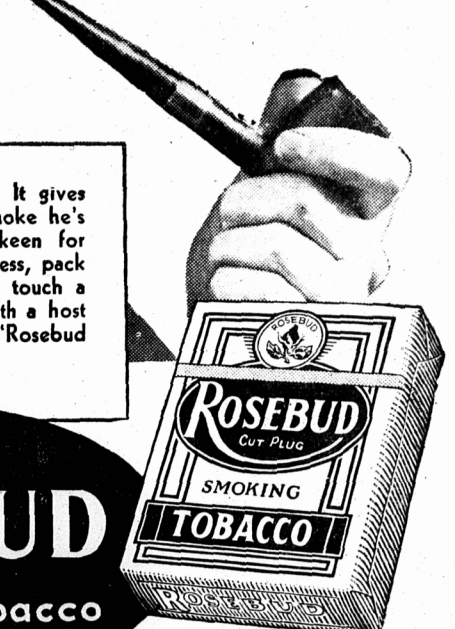
Baseball men, quite unanimously, agreed that Cochrane's active playing career is at an end.

## Denny Shute Leads Way Into P.G.A. Quarter-finals

PITTSBURGH, May 27—Champion Denny Shute had a champion's heart and shots today and strode magnificently into the quarter-finals of the United States Professional Golfers Association title play.

Challenged by Ed Dudley of Philadelphia and down most of the way through the first round, Shute produced three birdies in the last seven holes to win the match, 3 and 2.

Others who qualified for the round of eight were Jimmy Hines, Garden City, N. J., Tony Manero, Peabody, Mass., Harold "Jug" McSpaden, Winchester, Mass., all quarter-finalists last year, and Byron Nelson, Reading, Pa., Henry Picard, Hershey, Pa., and Ky Laffoon and Harry Cooper, Chicago.

Slashing around the field club's hills in drenching rain, McSpaden, Laffoon and Hines earned a place alongside Shute by their work today.

McSpaden eliminated Sam Sneed of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Jug shot a 69, the best round of the day, in the morning and picked up only a single hole. In the afternoon he hung desperately to this slight advantage and young Sneed beat himself.

Laffoon was two down to long-belling Jimmy Thomson, of Shawnee-on-Deleware, Pa., at the end of 18 holes but plodded carefully through the afternoon storm

and added to his lead as Thomson faded.

Hines was two down to Paul Runyan of White Plains, N. Y., as the end of the first round and similarly he kept close to par while little Paul explored two thick rough and water-filled traps. Hines won the match 2 and 1.

In the other matches Picard beat Horton Smith of Chicago, 4 and 3; Nelson drubbed popular Johnny Farrell of Short Hills, N. J., 5 and 4; Manero outlasted Vic Ghezzi of Deal, N. J., 3 and 1; and Copper drubbed Jim Foulis of Chicago, 5 and 4.

## No Dominion Track Meet

VANCOUVER, May 27—Ann Clark, President of the Women's Amateur Athletic Federation, said today Dominion Track and Field Championships for women were "definitely off this year."
