CREED, PRACTICE, TESTIMONY

A British Creed: I believe in Prohibition because it will give the little children a chance; because it will be to the rising generation of youth a pathway of safety; because it is an aid to efficiency; because it is the handmaiden of public safety; because the continuance of the liquor traffic means continued economic waste; because it will help to clean up politics; because the Kingdom of God cannot come while the liquor traffic is here. (Abbreviated—Mark H. C. Hayler).

American Practice: "Long before national prohibition went into effect the Knights of Columbus, and every Catholic society of national prominence, with one exception, barred from membership those engaged in the liquor business. The Laws of the Knights of Columbus deny membership in that order to anyone engaged in the manufacture or sale, either wholesale or retail, of intoxicating liquor as a beverage, and should one engage in such business or occupation after joining the Order, he thereby forfeits his membership. To my own personal knowledge, some of the most prominent Catholics in Kentucky were barred from membership in the Knights of Columbus by this prohibition." (Col. P. H. Callahan, Louisville, Kentucky).

Canadian Testimony: "I have never shirked hard work. I have led an exceedingly active life, calling for constant and exhausting physical and mental exertion: have traveled as many miles, faced as many ailments, and done as much organization and administrative work as perhaps any man now living in Canada, and have done this without the aid of intoxicants of any sort. . . . As I have journeyed along my life pathway of eighty years I have never known an instance where man or woman was made stronger in body, more alert in mind, or purer in spirit by the beverage use of intoxicants; while all along that pathway I have seen numberless men and women degraded, wrecked and ruined by it. (Hon. Sir George E. Foster).

To help one's neighbor—that's the simple Christian creed. A body wrecked, a blighted soul, reveal the brewer's greed.

After many tests and tests of tests, Dr. Walter R. Miles, professor at Yale University, at hearings before the Ways and Means Committee, was forced to the conclusion, "There is no longer room for doubt in reference to the toxic action of alcoholic beverages as weak as 2.75 per cent by weight."

Speaking recently at the Men's Forum, Ont., Judge Wearing emphatically stated, "Christians are too complacent over present conditions."

SONS OF TEMPERANCE ANNIVERSARY

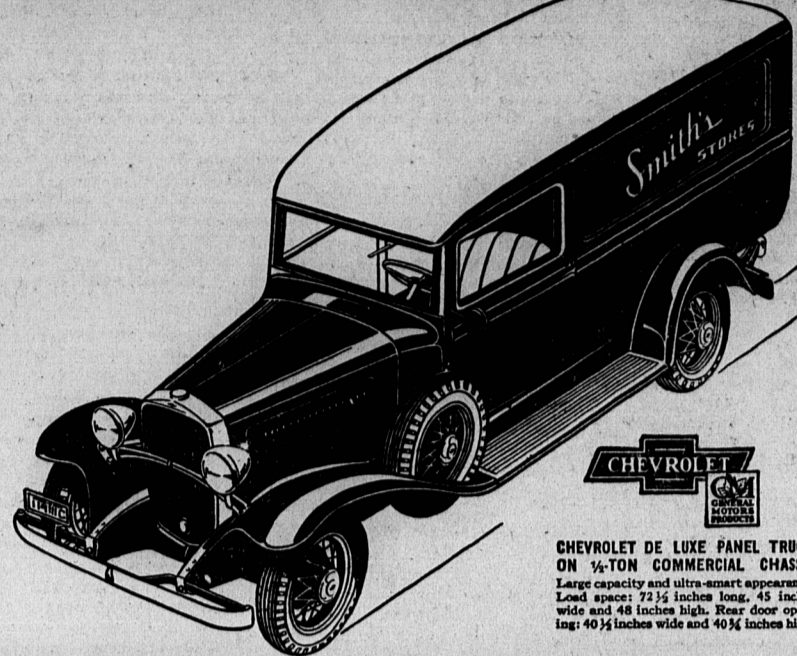

The following which describes the organization of the Division and which appeared in the Charlottetown papers of the time, will be of interest to many readers: "On 1949: the 13th inst, Hon Charles Young, Grand Worthy Patriarch, having received a requisition from certain constituents of Georgetown to open a Division in that place, granted to prayer of the application, and, assisted by his A. D. C., proceeded to form a Division in Georgetown under the title of the "Diamond of the Desert" Division No. 9, S. T., and initiated the Requisitionists. On the following evening the G. W. P. lectured to a large and respectable audience upon the principles of the Order, and at the close of the lecture, other gentlemen stepped forward and desired to become "Sons!" The meeting having been closed in the usual manner, the Division was opened in form, and after the last mentioned gentlemen had been duly initiated, the following brethren were installed as officers of the Division until the first day of July next:

William Sanderson, W. P., James M. Cogswell, W. A., James Easton, R. S., James S. Holland, A. R. S., Charles MacLaren, F. S., Alexander Robertson, Treas., James Kellow, Cond., Richard Gaddy, A. C., John Macdonald, I. S., Alexander Ferguson, O. S."

Wm. Mackay, Esq., was conducted to the Chair of P. W. P. After the G. W. P. had given the officers and members due instructions and inculcated upon them the necessity of acting upon the benevolent principles of the Order, the Division nominated their W. P. as their Representative to Grand Division and unanimously passed a vote of thanks to the G. W. P. for his exertions, not only in advancing the cause of Temperance in this Island, but for his kindness and urbanity to them, and this having been duly acknowledged, the Division was closed with the usual formalities."

The following is also a clipping from the "Islander," of April 24th, 1849.

"To the Editor of the Islander: Sir: About the middle of March the Hon. Charles Young, in his capacity of G. W. P. of the Sons of Temperance of Prince Edward Island, established a Division of that

Order in Georgetown, by the name of "Diamond of the Desert" Division No. 9, as already appeared in the newspapers. At the first invitation only nine brethren appeared; however next evening after the delivery of a most excellent lecture by the G. W. P., three more joined the Division and ever since, the numbers have been gradually increasing in perfect harmony. At the present time the roll shows twenty-four members actually initiated, with every prospect of further increase.

As yet the Division has not been assisted by a stated lecturer, but on the evening of Tuesday the 17th inst., the W. P. delivered a luminous and succulent lecture, to a numerous and highly respectable audience, on temperance in general taking for his text: "As we have opportunity let us do good to all men," which he clearly demonstrated to be the object of the Sons of Temperance, the hearers manifesting their appreciation by long and rapturous applause.

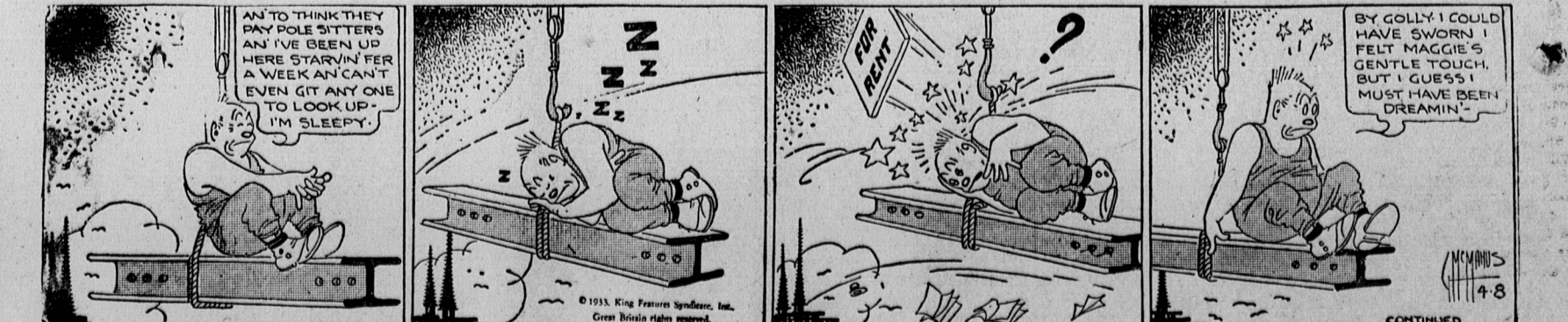
