Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any other person, 21 years of age or over, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application must be made in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency, but not at a Sub-Agency on certain conditions. (1) Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. (2) Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties: Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent of certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years on 100 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, M.G. PROCEEDINGS IN THE LEGISLATURE

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE. Tuesday, April 10.

The House met today at 4 p.m. On motion of Hon. Mr. Wood a bill incorporating "The Mount Herbert Silver Black and Patch Fox Company," was read a second time, considered by the House in committee, and passed for a third reading. On motion of Mr. Wood a bill incorporating the "Alexander Rural Telephone Company," was read a second time and considered by a committee of the whole House. It was passed for the third reading. On motion of Hon. S. H. Jenkins, a bill entitled "An Act to Further Amend An Act to Incorporate the P.E.I. Pharmaceutical Association" was read a second time, and referred to a committee of the whole House. Dr. Jenkins explained that the object of the amendment was to prevent others than legally qualified druggists from going into the business. Mr. Hughes said that under the law as it stands at present doctors can open drug stores without being qualified druggists, and some doctors opened drug stores for the purpose of circumventing the prohibition law by selling intoxicating liquors. Dr. A. A. McDonald said he did not think the amendment was called for. The doctors would not use their drug stores as a cloak for the sale of alcoholic liquor any more than druggists would. He said that the amendment would affect doctors who were doing a perfectly legitimate business.

Dr. Jenkins explained that the act was not intended to be retroactive, but only to apply to those who would go into the business in the future. There was some further discussion on the subject after which on the motion of Mr. J. A. Dewar, the Speaker, took the chair, the chairman of the committee reported progress and asked leave to sit again. The bill, which will come up for further consideration, was as follows: "An Act to Further Amend An Act to Incorporate the Prince Edward Island Pharmaceutical Association." (Hon. Mr. Jenkins.)

"BE IT ENACTED by the Lieutenant-Governor, and Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island, as follows: 1. Section ten of an Act to Incorporate the Prince Edward Island Pharmaceutical Association (5 Edward VII, Cap. 21) is hereby amended by striking out the words "and they may be registered as Pharmaceutical Chemists or Druggists without undergoing examination" in the thirty-third, thirty-fourth, and thirty-fifth lines thereof, and also by striking out the words "and no person shall be permitted to engage in and carrying on the business of an Apothecary, Chemist or Druggist without examination" in the thirty-eighth, thirty-ninth, fortieth and forty-first lines thereof.

A full report of the discussion will be given later.

In the afternoon Hon. Murdoch McKinnon resumed the debate on the Budget and at the evening session concluded his speech, being followed by Hon. J. A. McNeill, and Mr. Walter M. Lea. At 11 p. m., Sir Charles Dalton moved the adjournment of the debate.

bill extending the time for the maturity of debentures was re-committed to permit of the insertion of certain words that had been omitted in the draft. This was agreed to by 14 to 12. The Charlottetown Water Works and the Charlottetown Sewerage Amendment Act was read a third time and passed, as was also the bill to incorporate the Savage Harbour and Prince Village Rural Telephone Company. After luncheon the third reading was taken of the Travellers' Rest Hall Company and the Trustees of Princeton Royalty Church and passed. The St. Dunstan's College Incorporation Act was read a second time and taken in Committee when progress was reported. Prince Edward Island Development Commission Bill was discussed in committee and reported with amendment. At the evening session Mount Herbert Silver Black and Patch Fox Co. Bill was read a third time and passed.

The debate on the Budget was resumed by Sir Charles Dalton, who was followed by Mr. Howatt, Mr. Dewar, Mr. Paton, Mr. Gallant and Mr. McNeill. At ten minutes past one the vote was taken and the motion to go into committee on supply unanimously adopted.

THURSDAY, APRIL 12.

The House went into committee on supply at 1.15 a. m., with Mr. Paton in the chair. In regard to the first item on the list "Attorney General, \$1200" and another "Fees and Disbursements, Supreme Court, \$4,000," Mr. Bell took exception. He claimed, in regard to the first that the Attorney General had employed others to do work which he should have done himself and had failed to perform his duty with regard to the second item to the prohibition act. The Attorney General had objected, "Fees and Disbursements, Supreme Court, \$4,000," the Leader of the Opposition said he proposed to move, seconded by Mr. Hughes, that this item be reduced to \$3,000.

THE PREMIER strongly refuted the charge made against him by the Leader of the Opposition, and said there was no criminal case in the last five years that he did not himself conduct. True, said he, when there was a very heavy docket it was necessary to employ an attorney, as he (the Attorney General) could not be in two places at once. The honorable gentlemen's words, said the Premier, could only be characterized as the most vicious spleen. He should know that the Attorney General has numerous duties to look after, succession duties and estates, for instance. There are those who deliberately withhold wills from registration until the close of the year in the hope of evading the income tax, in reference to remarks made by the Leader of the Opposition about non-payment of fox taxes the Premier declared that where trouble had been found the Leader of the Opposition was generally found close behind it. There were fox cases for example in which it had been shown that the Leader of the Opposition had advised people not to pay their taxes. In reference to his allegation that the Premier had dismissed two officers against the Prohibition law, the Premier said these cases referred to were Charlottetown Police Court cases and the Recorder, the Stipendiary Magistrate had exercised his right to discharge the prisoners, upon the recommendation of their clerks. This practise of the City Magistrate is a custom as old as the law and the step had been taken not with the idea of clemency but to help

these men to make a fresh start in a better direction.

As to the whole matter of the Prohibition law the Premier stated that the records show that the law was never so well enforced. No Attorney General anywhere supplies information. What the law does is to provide the machinery by which it can be enforced. If the leader of the Opposition knew of any violations his duty was to report same.

"The Hon. member of the Opposition moves for a decrease of the Court costs," said the Premier. He knows what the costs of the Courts are and yet the Hon. member hails cut of \$1000. If the jurors would cut other officials and expenses are to be paid all of the sum will be needed. A less sum than \$4000 is not a safe sum with which to face the current year.

MR. BELL said his charge that politicians had been liberated was borne out by a charge of the Chief Justice, the report of the Grand Jury and other bodies.

THE PREMIER replied that the Chief Justice's charge was general and did not specify by whom.

MR. BELL said three specific charges were made—the first by the Grand Jury which claimed no prosecutions were made where they should have been; convictions not being enforced, and the allowing of prisoners out before their term was up.

MR. JOHNSTON said he did not think the Premier's salary as Attorney-General or Leader of the Government was too much. He thought the Government should practise the utmost economy and said the people could hardly be expected to practise economy if the Government did not. (Continued on Page Three.)
