Secretary Albert Quigley, well known promoter of Saint Peters race meet and Secretary of the track, was in Charlottetown a few days ago and is getting set for his July races. He has announced Wednesday afternoon, July 12th, as the date and is now figuring on suitable classes to make the best racing and draw the biggest crowds.

Workouts at the Charlottetown Driving Park track the past few days were fewer and difficulties greater on account of the rainy weather. Mr. Henley and Johnny Miles hooked up in a couple of duels and registered miles in 2:23 and 2:22, finishing heads apart.

Volo Rico worked in 2:18 with the last half in 1:08. This is the fastest mile to date over the Charlottetown track. Hush worked in 2:25 with the last quarter in 33 seconds and looks good. These were the principal miles registered.

Billy Cope 2:10, the "track record buster" is temporarily at least laid on the shelf. Billy's occupation instead ofavoring around the oval is nibbling grass. He will be under the care of Dr. Green for the summer and his game little form will be greatly missed on race tracks.

Worthy Louise 2:15 will again be placed in training by Frank McKay and should be a good factor in the 2:20 class trots or 2:22 mixed races on the "Spud" circuit.

About eight or ten colts are receiving lessons at the Charlottetown track. They are good mannered and step around the course like old performers, but we have not really seen any of them show much in the line of "whiz."

Speaking of colt development, we would suggest to those who have colts that they would feed more grain. We believe that lack of it is the reason our colts are so much smaller and more juvenile compared with similarly aged colts reared in the U.S.A.

Margaret Dillon 1:59 1-4 who with Miss Harris M. is the holder of the world's record for pacing mares, died a week ago at Lexington, Ky. She was 18 years of age and started racing as a four year old and continued until eleven years of age. In her career on the turf she won 43 races and with the exception of May E. Grattan 1:59 1-4 is the largest race winning pacing mare, May having won 45 to Margaret's 43 trips.

She was a daughter of Dillon Axworthy (3) 2:10 1-4 and Margaret Prima 2:14 1-4 by Peter the Great 2:07 1-4.

Guy McKinney 1:58 3-4 who was a whale of a trotter and won the Hambletonian Stake as a three year old, has been slow in making his mark as a sire, but last week broke into the limelight with three new 2:10 trotters in Captain Hanover (2) 2:06 1-2, Topsy Hanover (3) 2:08 1-4 and Evalene Hanover (3) 2:08 3-4.

Vic Fleming recently marked Councillor, owned by Allan J. Wilson of Boston in 2:05 1-4. Most of Wilson's string are being trained and raced by Walter Brittenfield.

The 2:28 pace was won by Belle Peters after Dorothy Grattan had captured the first heat. There were 12 starters in this event, best time 2:15 1-2. The 2:22 pace was won by My Old Pal, Fisco Direct winning the first heat, six starters, best time 2:17.

Father and son, Harry Brusie and Lyman Brusie won three of the four events at the Bay State Circuit races, Chatham, N. Y., last week. Harry won the two year old trot with Sturdy after Rebecca Hanover had won the first heat in 2:13. The two year old pace was won by Hanover Prophet driven by Lyman Brusie, best time 2:17 1-4. Hanover Prophet had previously taken a two year old record of 2:11 1-4 at Goshen, N. Y., Mile track.

At Belleville, Ont., on Wednesday afternoon under rather unfavorable weather conditions, some remarkably good racing took place. Baldwin won the 2:16 class in straight heats, stepping the third heat in 2:10 3-4 with Lou Ganot, Vernon McKinney Jr., and Jimmy the Tramp finishing in the order named. The 2:25 class was won by Todd Grattan in straight heats, W. J. Grattan, Katherine Grattan and Peter K. being two, three, four, respectively, best time 2:15.

Graded shipments in carlots or less sold for 20 to 20 1/2 cents a dozen for extras, 19 1/2 to 19 cents for firsts, unchanged and 13 to 13 1/2 cents for seconds, up 1/2 cent. Receipts totaled 2,221 cases.

Wholesale butter prices held unchanged, no 1 butter in carlots or less selling at 19 1/2 cents a pound. A total of 1,937 boxes was offered for sale.

The cheese market was steady at 11 cents a lb. for Ontario cheese and 10 1/2 cents for Quebec cheese. Arrivals were 6,742 boxes.
