Water Shortage Affects Paper Co.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Oct. 9 —(CP)—Nearly 250 employees of the St. John Sulphite, Limited, plant were temporarily thrown out of work today by a power shortage resulting from scarcity of water. The plant has been placed on one shift, employing upwards of 50 men, instead of three shifts. Spoken for by the workers claimed that if a general attempt to conserve power were made by householders and industry the plant would be able to resume full operations.

Hon. J. C. Boucher, chairman of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, said an effort was being made to bring about such a voluntary reduction in power consumption. There had been no alternative to reducing the power supply to the sulphite plant. An adequate supply would be available with completion of the Commission's new power plant at Chatham in four or five months.

Britain Sells More Gold; South Africa Agrees To Loan

LONDON, Oct. 9 —(AP)—An authoritative Government source indicated today that Britain has sold another \$200,000,000 worth of gold to the United States and an official announcement said South Africa had agreed to lend the United Kingdom \$80,000,000 (\$200,000,000 of the metal to reinforce the sterling supply.

The informant said it was his "impression" that published reports were true that Britain had dipped again into her "last-ditch" gold reserves in an exchange for dollars with which to pay for purchases from the United States. Britain sold \$80,000,000 worth of gold to the United States early last month. Before that her gold reserves, used to back the British currency, were estimated at \$2,400,000,000.

An official announcement of the gold sale has not yet been made. The sale of gold was one of the sources for stop-gap financing mentioned Wednesday by Sir Stafford Cripps, Economics Minister, who said Britain could get along by such means if assured of Marshall plan aid by next June.
