PLEA FOR WOMEN UNAVAILING

Medical schools of London may continue to ban women as students despite the recent request of the University of London Senate to consider the possibility of admitting them again. The report suggests that places should be given to 100 women students and that there should be mixed classes as well as those for men or women only. The Senate makes its request on the basis that "women gain by being educated side by side with men and that such an education is a very valuable training for that co-operation which in their subsequent careers becomes necessary between medical men and women." The objection to the plan is that young men refuse to be co-educated, and go to schools which do not admit women.


