BRIDGETOWN.—A meeting called in the interest of better schools was held in the hall on Wednesday evening. A large representation from five school districts were present. Mr. Wm. McLeod was elected to chair. After stating the purpose of the gathering he called for an address by Supt. of Education, Col. R. H. Campbell. The present position and need of our schools were ably presented, emphasizing the imminent danger of a very serious dearth of teachers and the calamity that must ensue if we send forth our young people without adequate mental training and discipline. The need of better schools was fully realized by all progressive nations and we could not afford to allow our province to fall hopelessly behind. Rev. H. A. Brown also addressed the meeting pointing out the importance of the teacher to the community. He strongly pleaded for better school houses in the country, and the need for teachers not only mentally equipped but of high moral and spiritual ideals. The teacher creates the atmosphere of the school, but parents, trustees and the community are responsible to see that it is always clean and wholesome. Several persons joined in discussing the problem and in motion it was unanimously resolved to petition the Government to increase the salary of our teachers so as to retain and give stability to the profession.

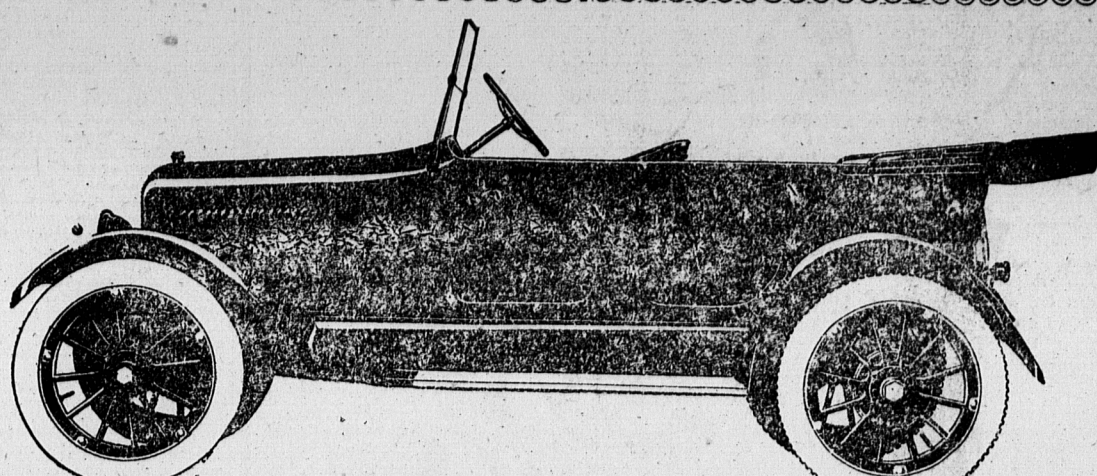
