LIBERAL CONVENTION.

The Liberals of the second electoral district of Queen's met yesterday to choose candidates to represent the party in the coming local election. The chair was occupied by Berj. Rogers, President of the Queen's County Liberal Association.

On motion of William Moffatt, Mayfield seconded by James Wyne, New Haven, and supported by Allan Livingston, Nine Mile Creek, Dr. A. E. Douglas was nominated as the candidate for Assemblyman. There being no other names mentioned the motion was carried amid great applause which the Doctor in an eloquent speech fittingly acknowledged.

Hon. John Balderston of North Wiltshire, moved, seconded by Robert A. McPhail, Nine Mile Creek, that Hugh McMillan of New Haven, be the candidate for councillor.

D. K. McNeill of St. Catherines, moved,

seconded by James McLean, Nine Mile Creek, that John McMillan of Fairview, be the candidate for councillor.

On a ballot being taken the latter had a majority of one vote and his nomination was made unanimous. Messrs. McMillan brothers.

Addresses were given by the candidates, Hon. J. H. Cumiskey, Hon. John Balderston, Wm. Moffatt, D. K. McNeill, Simon Pineo, Allan Livingston, Wm. Howard, John McLean, James McLean and others, and resolutions passed approving of the present Government policy and the appointment of D. A. McKinnon, M.P., to the Governorship of the Province.
