Handling Large Quantities of Fish

MONTREAL, May 7—The first of a shipment of 53,000,000 pounds of fresh halibut the largest catch ever reported at Prince Rupert where the season opened this week, left that city today on a Canadian National express "fish extra". The fresh fish is on its way to dinner tables across the Dominion and in the United States.

"It will be one of the shortest halibut seasons on record according to reports received from our agent at Prince Rupert," said C. E. Bellerose, general manager Canadian National Express here. It is expected to extend no more than four or five weeks at most. The catch has been limited to a new high figure of 26,500 tons.

The short season is due to the big increase in the number of fishing vessels operating in the Prince Rupert area this year. Many of them are considerably larger than any boats which have ever been used up to now. They are moving into that area from San Francisco and other southern Pacific coast points.

To handle the big halibut shipment out of Prince Rupert the C.N.R. will operate six "fish specials" in each of the next four or five weeks with a minimum of sixty cars a week. There will also be cars required to handle the Ketchikan Alaska halibut catch which will be brought to Prince Rupert for rail shipment and for the movement of fresh salmon.

The halibut will be distributed throughout Western Canada and to Toronto, Windsor, Hamilton, Ottawa, Montreal and Quebec in the east. It will move to the central and eastern United States over C.N.R. lines via Buffalo, Chicago, Rouses Point and Boston.
