Historic Event
In History of
Island Firm

An important event in the insurance world and to the community life of the Province took place last night at the Charlottetown Hotel, when the firm of Hyndman and Company Limited entertained their agency and staff organization at a banquet to commemorate the seventh anniversary of the founding of the firm by the late Fred W. Hyndman, R.N., in 1872, and it also happened to be the fiftieth anniversary of the entry into the insurance business of the present manager, Mr. J. O. Hyndman. In addition, it was also the thirty-fifth anniversary of the Great-West Life Assurance Company's entry into the Hyndman Agency in the year 1907.

Mr. J. O. Hyndman presented an outline of the various changes and experiences in the Mercantile and Insurance field through this long period. Telegrams and letters were read from their Head Offices, expressing congratulations and appreciation for the high quality of service rendered, not only to the insurance public, but to the great satisfaction of the companies.

Presentations were made during the banquet to the leading agents, during the month of May in an International Contest, put on by the Great-West Life. The Prince Edward Island Branch accepted a challenge from the Seattle, Washington Branch, and won out. Mr. J. Martin Currie of Montague won the first prize, and Mr. Allison P. McLean of Summerside, the second prize, based on percentage of gross. About twenty five persons attended the banquet and included Mr. Robinson, C.L.U., President of the Life Underwriters Association of Canada, and Mr. Gordon Nairn, Field Supervisor of the Organization of British Columbia.

Before the close of the banquet an address and two fine gifts were presented to Mr. Hyndman in commemoration of the occasion and in appreciation of the service he has rendered to all associated with the firm. To round up the event, Mr. Allison McLean, the District Manager at Summerside handed to Mr. Hyndman new life applications completed for the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars.

Returning to his native Province in 1870, he was appointed Marshal of the Vice-Admiralty Court, by the Imperial Government, and Secretary of the P. E. Island Railway by the Provincial Government. At that time Charlottetown was a well known port, as were many other Island centres, and shipping and shipbuilding was an important industry. As Mr. Hyndman's father and brother were shipowners and shippers, he naturally became interested in Marine Insurance, and formed a partnership with his brother Peter W. As Marine Insurance was a prime necessity to the industry, Fred W. carried on that business after the death of his brother. As a result of his unfailing attention to business, and the solidity of the company, also entered both with the insuring public and the insurance companies, the business progressed.

In later years, especially following the decline of the sailing ship, other forms of insurance were taken on. His son John O. Hyndman, now president of the company, also entered the business and this year celebrates his 50th year on the job. The growth of the business was steady, and many new connections were made with insurance companies necessary to carry the increasing insurable values.

In 1907, just 35 years ago, the firm became General Agents of the Province for the Great-West Life Assurance Co., and since then have built up the largest life insurance business in the province, along with the numerous other lines of insurance handled.

Among the Companies now represented the North British & Mercantile Ins. Co., and the Union Assurance Society have been continuously represented for more than fifty years, while several of the others have been for more than forty years.

On its 70th anniversary, the old firm is quietly progressing, and at this time a reminder of its past history might be in order.

In 1872 Mr. Fred W. Hyndman began the business which has been carried on continuously ever since, and which was incorporated in 1910 to ensure continuity.

Mr. Hyndman, the founder, entered the Royal Navy as a cadet in 1856, and during his fourteen years of service travelled extensively around the world. He served in many famous ships, and was for a time Paymaster on "H. M. S. Victoria," Nelson's famous old ship. The greater part of his naval service was spent with the Admiralty Hydrographic Survey in exploring many hitherto uncharted areas. During this period he took part in many interesting events, including the opening of the Suez Canal, on which he paid the first due ever received by the Canal Company.
