fitted with two screens to filter the liquid.

A vertical agitator is used for keeping the liquid thor-
oughly mixed and it is impossible for the ingredients to
settle while the machine is in motion. The driving power
is developed from both main wheels and everything is per-
fectly balanced, thereby allowing all working parts to start
instantly upon the movement of the machine.
