Wednesday evening the Union Commercial College closed for the Christmas holidays. The spacious rooms were thronged with enthusiastic students. Before the opening exercises the young ladies of the class passed their "home made" candy which was very much appreciated by all present. At 8 o'clock A. J. McAdam on behalf of the shorthand department presented Principal Moran with an address and an elaborate clock, inkstand and Plus A. McIntyre on behalf of the Commercial Students presented Mr. Eaton with an address accompanied with a fine set of ebony brushes in leather case.

Prin. Moran thanked the students for their handsome present and kind address. He referred to the good work done during past term and congratulated the students on their progress. He referred to certain circulars and letters that were being sent throughout the country in order to damage the reputation of the College. Copies of these letters were produced and read to the students. He intimated his intention of having the matter placed before the court. Vice Prin. Eaton thanked the students for their kind remembrance and was pleased to know that his efforts on their behalf were appreciated.
