CONFIDENCE IN PARTNER

In today's deal South placed perfect confidence in his partner's understanding and judgment, and by so doing reaped a fitting reward.

South dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.
East-West 30 on score.

Contract Bridge

It required good nerves, as well as great confidence in his partner, for South to stand fast when his four-spade bid was promptly doubled! His own preference for clubs was almost over-whelming, as may easily be imagined by comparing his anemic four-card spade suite with his presumably solid seven-card club suit.

Yet, South did stand fast at four spades doubled, because he felt that North, another expert, would interpret South's bidding and read the entire situation well enough to make the final decision. So, when North actually passed, instead of taking South back to his obviously far superior suit, South delivered a "vote of confidence" by also passing.

This type of situation is extremely difficult to handle. When one partner has a very long, solid or almost-solid suit, and another short, weak suit, and when in addition, the other partner cannot possibly "speak" for himself, the usual outcome is that a penalty is taken by playing the hand at the safest, rather than the best, contract. It was only because he had an expert partner that South could (first) venture to bid four spades, and (second) stay there when he was doubled. He knew that if he found North with less than four spades than North actually had in this case, North would correct the contract to five clubs, even if he was short in that latter suit. South's rebid of clubs at the three-level, before he mentioned spades, was a demand that North act as indicated.

South made his doubled contract easily. If he had persisted to five clubs, the opponents might have "saved" cheaply at five diamonds.
