VISITING HIS ISLAND HOME.—Rev. W. Sydney Mabon, B. D., of Toronto, who arrived on the island a week ago was in Charlottetown yesterday. He was one of the officiating clergymen at the funeral of his uncle, the late George Vessey of York, on Wednesday last. Mr. Mabon is being warmly welcomed by his old friends in Charlottetown, where he was formerly in the employ of the Bank of Nova Scotia. After nineteen years service he retired from the bank in 1906 and began a course for the ministry at the University of Toronto, graduating in 1910 with the degree of B.A. Subsequently he took a four years' course in theology, graduating with the degree of B. D. Since his ordination he has been in two charges in Ontario. Mr. Mabon is a native of York, and a brother of Mr. H. J. Mabon of Montague. He is a son of the late Ralph Mabon and a grandson of the late William Mabon, a native of Scotland and one of the first settlers of York. He received his early education in York school and at Prince of Wales College, being a contemporary student of the present principal, Dr. S. N. Robertson.

NEW TOLL RATES.—The management of the P. E. Island Telephone Company are advertising that beginning November 21st the new long distance toll rates will come into effect. The new copper toll circuit, recently completed at great expense, has been brought up to the highest standard of circuits operating on the mainland; and while the new rate here will not be as high as in other places, yet it has been necessary to make a slight increase over what the company have hitherto been receiving. The new rate however is in some cases a reduction, as it will be graded according to distance. Under the old flat rate of 25 cents people talking short distances actually paid more than they will be required to pay under the new rates. It is interesting to note that the old toll rate has never been increased by the company since it first came into operation in 1885, in view of the greatly increased cost of operation and equipment and the greatly increased efficiency in service, this is a remarkable record indeed, and shows the company to be a faithful public servant. The new toll-rate schedule will be advertised shortly from the Charlottetown office.
