This room was a closet, in which there were scraps of waste paper, etc. A few minutes application of the hose sufficed to make everything safe. The new hose and ladder truck, which had been given a try-out through the city and had just been taken back to the Fire Station was at the scene of the fire but was not used.

HOCKEY PLAYER ILL—Ches. Gregory, the pro hockey player has been in Aberdeen Hospital the past few days suffering from blood poisoning. Recently Chester got his thumb scratched. Paying no particular attention to it the thumb became swollen, and the scratch apparently becoming infected, blood poisoning of a serious character developed, and it was only by the utmost exertions of the doctors that he did not lose several fingers. DAIRY DIRECTORS MEET—A special meeting of the directors of the Provincial Dairy Association was held yesterday in the office of the Provincial Department of Agriculture. The president Mr. J. H. Simpson, Bay View, presided, the other directors being Messrs. J. S. Cousins, Park Corner, W. Cain, New Perth, Albert Schurman, Beedmore, W. H. McGregor, Lot 16 John J. McKinnon, Bear River, and J. S. Coffey (secretary) Kensington. Hon. J. H. Myers, Commissioner of Agriculture, Messrs. Wilfred Boulter and W. J. Reid of the Department of Agriculture were also present. The principal business was the appointment of two directors Messrs. J. H. Simpson and J. S. Cousins, to attend the Dominion Dairy Conference at Ottawa on November 14, 15 and 16. Matters of grading, factory instruction and routine business were discussed.

BRINGING IN THE SPOILS.—Four motor trucks were required Sunday to take to the city the eight hundred gallon rum haul made Saturday at Rustico. After the little fat puncheons had been safely loaded and the convoy got underway and had proceeded about two miles one of the trucks broke down and the liquor had to be unloaded and left temporarily at Mr. B. C. Woolman's house. Mr. Woolman drove the delayed load of twenty-two kegs to the Customs Office yesterday afternoon. His progress along the city streets was followed by the interested, and even wistful glances of a number of citizens.

BLESSED IS THE PEACEMAKER—Congratulating himself upon the performance of a benevolent job in separating two belligerents who were arguing violently with each other in Kensington Saturday night, Mr. Alex. Campbell related to his home in Freetown to seek the restful slumber which should be the reward of a peacemaker after a strenuous day. At about 1:30 a. m. Sunday morning however, upon opening his door in response to a loud summons, he was dragged out into the street and given a severe beating-up by four men who arrived at his house in a motor car. One of them was one of the men he had succeeded in making the peace in Kensington, and the others, it is understood, were near relations. Mr. Campbell, badly bruised about the face and body, reported the incident to Mr. Profit, J. P. at Kensington. As the affair happened in Queen's County Mr. Profit could do nothing in the
