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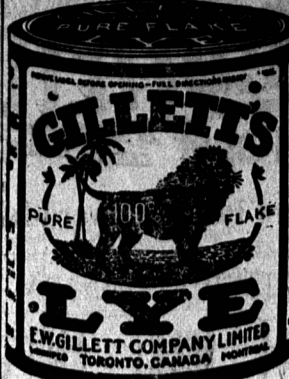

Successful Year for Canadian National

OTTAWA, May 28.—Hon. G. F. Graham, Minister of Railways announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that the total deficit on the Canadian National lines last year was \$52,779,350 including fixed charges, compared with \$58,686,911 the year before. The total income before fixed charges was \$13,365,376 compared with \$1,444,226 the previous year.

"If Sir Henry Thornton" said Mr. Graham, "is able to maintain the same rate of improvement as he has achieved during the first year of his presidency the railways themselves in addition to meeting operating charges, ought to be able within a very few years to meet all the interest charges due the public, which would be a wonderful achievement."

The Canadian Government Merchant Marine showed a deficit after all charges, including depreciation and interest of \$9,368,870.
