IRISH PROBLEM STILL UNSOLVED

CARSON'S "ARMY" ORDERS.

ARMAGH, Ireland, July 25.—A warning was issued yesterday to the Ulster Volunteers to be ready for instant mobilization.

LONDON, July 25.—The Daily Telegraph's Dublin correspondent yesterday sent a startling message to the effect that an infantry army being despatched to Ulster, and that those who are engaged in field operations in that province are being mobilized with a view of coping with any contingency that may arise.

LONDON, July 25.—The fact that the conference at Buckingham Palace between the leaders of the various political parties had been rendered abortive by its failure to agree on the area of Ulster to be excluded from the control of the Dublin Parliament, was confirmed by Premier Asquith in the House of Commons today.

The Premier's statement on the subject of yesterday's meeting of the conference was very brief. He said: "The possibility of finding an area to be excluded from the operation of the Irish Home Rule Bill was considered in principle or in detail on such an area, brought its meeting to a close."

WAR IS NOW INEVITABLE SERBIAN MINISTER LEFT VIENNA

VIENNA, July 26.—Diplomatic relations between Austria-Hungary and Serbia were broken off formally Saturday night and war is regarded as inevitable.
