MANY of our readers will learn with sorrow of the death of Alex. McKay, of Darley, which occurred suddenly last Saturday evening. Although for some time under treatment for heart disease Mr. McKay was in his usual health up to the time of his death. He had been working on his farm all day Saturday and retired at about his usual bed hour. A few moments after he had retired, without a symptom of pain and without complaint, he passed away. The cause of death, doubtless, was heart disease. Mr. McKay was one of the most prosperous farmers of Darley, an upright, honorable citizen and one who will be greatly missed in the community. He leaves a widow, one son, John Thomas McKay, and two daughters, Mrs. Stanford Gay of this town, and Miss Mary at home. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon and was very largely attended.—Far.
