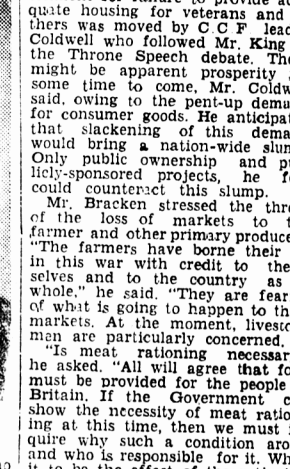
Bracken Says Farmers Fear For Markets
