TARIFF CHANGES.

It is evident from Mr. Tarte's newspaper, La Patrie, that the ex-Minister of Public Works is not only favorable to, but expects that some important changes in the customs tariff may be made during the current session of Parliament. The changes which Mr. Tarte anticipates appear to relate to woolen goods, white cottons, iron goods and binder twine. No doubt the wish is father to the thought, as Mr. Tarte is a protectionist. He would not only be gratified to have the duties increased for the purpose of affording greater protection, but also as an evidence that the Government felt compelled to adopt his views as to tariff changes.

But Mr. Fielding may, and we think probably will take a different view. He will perhaps claim that the fiscal system of the country is working satisfactorily, and that tariff stability is of more consequence than the making of changes at this stage. It is quite certain that if the tariff on cottons, woollens, iron goods and binder twine were to be opened up for revision it might be much more difficult than it now is to prevent a very general revision of the schedules. We would think that the Government would desire to prevent any such general revision at this time, if only because it would seem to show that Mr. Tarte was in the right in demanding such revision and that his colleagues were wrong. For these reasons we are prepared to accept the commonly received opinion that there will be few if any changes in the tariff this year.

The regular Easter Meeting was held in St. Paul's Schoolroom last evening at which the report of the past year's work was submitted and the accounts passed. Outside of ordinary routine the most important step taken was the appointment of a Committee to procure plans for the erection of a New Sunday School, which Committee was ordered to report, as soon as possible to a congregational meeting to be called for that purpose. At the Easter meeting of St. Peter's Cathedral congregation held last night the financial statement of receipts and expenditure was submitted showing a satisfactory state of affairs, A. J. B. Mellish was re-elected churchwarden and treasurer, the other church wardens being Messrs T. J. Harris and Ernest De B. Peake, W. H. Stewart was elected auditor. Various matters of interest were discussed, the estimates submitted for the new financial year adopted and votes of thanks accepted the unsalaried officials and those whose work had contributed to the well being of the congregation.
