5 Major Planks Are Platformed

OTTAWA, Aug. 6 (CP)—The Liberal party nailed five major planks into its platform today but hammered its thumb on two others.

Constitutional delegates, having their first national convention since 1929, talked back to the powerful resolutions committee and forced two planks to be held up for further carpentry.

The convention approved these policies:

1. Expanded trade, through general reduction of world barriers, extension of reciprocal arrangements with the United States and similar arrangements with the empire countries.

2. A program of adequate national defence, with operational and reserve forces capable of rapid expansion. Canada would plan with "free" nations for joint defence against aggression.

3. Extensive immigration on a selective basis, having regard to Canada's capacity to absorb immigrants without injury to her economy or fundamental changes in her social structure.

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Freight Rates Issue Caucused By Maritimers

OTTAWA, Aug. 6 (CP)—Sweeping measures to bolster the economy of the Maritime Provinces were urged today by Maritime delegates at the Liberal national convention.

At a caucus attended by the premiers of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, the east-coast delegates drafted a resolution urging:

1. That present freight conventions on mill feeds and feed grains be incorporated as part of a permanent national policy.

2. That the principles underlying the Maritime Freight Rates Act be endorsed and extended to give effect to the recommendations of the Duncan Commission on Maritime Claims.

3. That decentralization of industry be encouraged and cheap electric power be made available to Maritime industry.

4. That trade treaties be negotiated, giving particular consideration to the marketing of the natural products of the Maritime Provinces—fish, lumber, and products of farm and mine.

5. That Maritime transportation problems be given immediate attention with a view to improving rail, highway and aerial facilities and making fullest possible use of Maritime ports.

Atherton Is Surprised By Appointment

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6—Ray Atherton, United States Ambassador to Canada, has resigned that post and been appointed an alternate delegate to the forthcoming General Assembly of the United Nations in Paris.

Ray Atherton, for five years U.S. Ambassador to Canada, said he would make a trip to Washington last week when President Truman dropped a hint that he needed a career diplomat as alternate delegate to the General Assembly of the United Nations in Paris.

"Of course I volunteered," said Mr. Atherton. "I've been on conferences all my life. But I did not expect a decision so soon."

He had just returned from a holiday in Jasper when the news reached him of his acceptance by Mr. Truman as U. S. alternate delegate.

External Affairs Department spokesmen were surprised by the sudden White House move.

"Profound regret" was expressed by officials who had not yet learned full details of the Atherton resignation.

External Affairs Minister St. Laurent, busy with the Liberal convention and the possibility that he may become the next leader of the Liberal Party, could not be reached for comment. It

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Martin Mentioned For Leadership

OTTAWA, Aug. 6 (CP)—A fourth candidate—youthful Paul Martin—was thrust into the Liberal leadership race today on the eve of tomorrow's ballot-taking and it appears likely that at least a four-man contest would develop.

A British Columbia delegate, Alex Fisher of Kootenay East, made the formal overture of placing a written nomination for the 45-year-old Health Minister in the hands of convention officials. Nominations close officially at 2 p.m. tomorrow.

Mr. Martin declined to indicate whether or not he would allow his name to go into the balloting, saying only that his statement of yesterday, in which he publicly announced his support for external affairs Minister St. Laurent, "still stands."

But it was noted that at no place in that statement did he make a clear declaration that he would not accept nomination.

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
