The following appeal is from the pen of Dr. Charles W. Gordon, (Ralph Connor), Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada for 1921. It is ordered to be read in all the pulpits of the Presbyterian Churches in Canada on Oct. 2, the day appointed by the General Assembly for special personal humiliation. It is an appeal which all Canada will be willing to hear for its intrinsic worth.

THE MODERATOR'S PASTORAL

My Dear Comrades.—The Forward Movement Committee calls our Church to prayer on October 2nd as the first step in the program for this year. The idea is that from Halifax to Vancouver, from Dawson to the Line, with one accord we should give ourselves to prayer that day.

This was His plan for that first company of ours when He saw that we were in need. He saw that the most despicable group in that most despicable of the world, the stewards, were despising us. Listen to their babble: "Lorn, is this the time?"

After three years, oh wonderful years!—of comradeship with the Christ after the Cross, the heart-racking Passion of the Cross, after the Resurrection Dawn, the vivid happy dawn after forty days of intensive teaching, after all that and more, that silly question was the best they could do: "The Kingdom of Israel," forsooth! Poor souls! Poor desperate souls! and a world waiting their message!
